A RARE FIND.—The Halifax Mail says: A fisherman has turned his attention to digging out the old ruins at Lunenburg. Having ascertained from maps of the old town shown him by visitors, he commenced at the ruins of the governor's office on the west side of the barracks; After working for some time he discovered a number of coins among the rubbish. He carefully overhauled every spadeful until he got over one hundred coins, about thirty gold and silver, balance copper, the dates on many of them intelligible, being from 1690 to 1745. He also found a diamond of stone, being, experts think, part of a seal ring, having cut on it a crown above a bunch of roses with a wreath underneath.

A DISASTROUS ACCIDENT.—The Summerside Pioneer says: Mr. George Taylor, of Lower Freetown, near the hatchery, lost a valuable mare last Tuesday, and very nearly lost his own life as well. On that day he went to Wright's mill, near Centreville, with the mare and truck-wagon. He had driven out on the dam and turned the beast to give her a drink. As he was getting out of the wagon, something frightened the mare, and being very spirited, she sprang out into the water. The truck-wagon sank, leaving the box floating in the water, with Mr. Taylor in it. He promptly got out to catch the reins and try to save the mare, but he found that the wagon was dragging her down; and as he had no footing he again caught hold of the box, but was unable to get into it. As the mill was in motion those inside did not hear Mr. Taylor's shouts, and it was only by accident that some one came out and saw the predicament he was in. He was quickly rescued in an exhausted condition. The mare was drowned, and being a very fine animal the loss to Mr. Taylor will be a severe one.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

New Extradition Treaty.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.

There was a report here on Friday night to the effect that a new extradition treaty had been agreed upon between the United States and Great Britain. It was also stated that the Behring Sea question was the first one that Blaine expects to be brought forward by the British minister when they begin to consider diplomatic matters. It is this one too, in which Canada is most concerned, because of the urgency of the British Columbia sealing interest and the pressure the British Columbia members of Parliament are putting on the Ottawa Cabinet. The cause of the current report is explained to be that the Canadian Minister of Justice has been getting up some data concerning extradition to be used in the near future. The subject is undoubtedly being fully prepared by the British legation with a view to negotiations.

The Fast Line Service.

MONTREAL, Oct. 27.

Hon. Mr. Abbott arrived back from England on Saturday. Interviewed respecting the fast line service, he intimated that the refusal of the Government to give rail facilities was the cause. The understanding was that the C. P. R. should have the same facilities for carrying passengers from Halifax over the Intercolonial that they were to have via the Moncton and Salisbury branch if built. The Government have backed out of the arrangement. As quick transport through without a change of cars was indispensable to the success of the fast line service, the Andersons considered it useless to make the necessary arrangements.

Turkey's Solid Position.

BERLIN, Oct. 26.

The National Zeitung declares that Turkey occupies a solid position in European concert. She enjoys the protection afforded by the Berlin Treaty. Regarding Emperor William's coming visit to Constantinople, the papers say that the omission of such an act of courtesy would admit of the worst interpretation.

Rumored Changes.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.

It was rumored here yesterday that Hon. Mr. Foster, Minister of Finance, is to be made Collector of Customs, at St. John, instead of Mr. Ruel, who will be superannuated on account of old age. Sir Leonard Tilley will then enter the cabinet and seek election in King's county in Foster's place.

A Battle Fought.

ZANZIBAR, Oct. 27.

Capt. Wiseman has had a battle with the natives under Bushere, and defeated them, killing or wounding 300 natives. Only seven Germans were killed. Three Arabs have been executed for the murder of officer Nailson of the East Africa Company.

A Royal Wedding.

ATHENS, Oct. 27.

The marriage of Princess Sophie of Prussia and Duke Sparta, Crown Prince of Greece, was solemnized to-day. The weather was delightful.

The Smallpox Scare.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.

There is intense excitement in Essex county over the smallpox scare. One of the patients now down with the disease is known to have travelled through the most populous parts of the county within the past few days.

More Trouble Feared.

JOHNSTOWN, Pa., Oct. 27.

The prospects that Johnstown will again be under water are very good. Rain has been falling almost continuously for the past 36 hours and a great many streets are already almost impassable to pedestrians.

Bradlaugh Better.

LONDON, Oct. 27.

Bradlaugh, who has been suffering from congestion of the lungs, has recovered, and will soon take a sea voyage with a view to regaining his full strength.

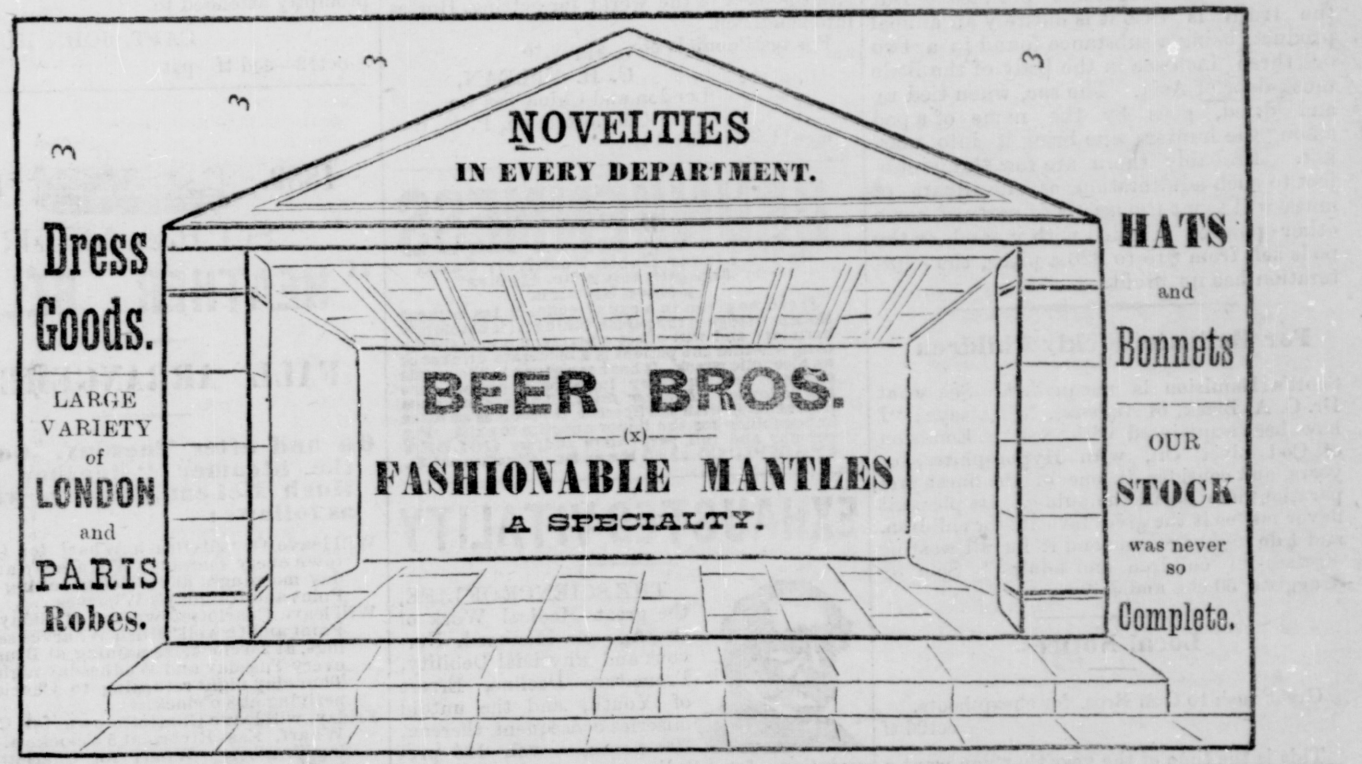
