## War Bride Arrives To Find Husband Dead

ISELIN, N. J. (AP)—A 22-year-old German war bride, who arrived by plane in New York with her infant daughter earlier in the day, learned Sunday night for the first time that her husband died Friday.

"I knew in my heart that we'd never get together," Mrs. Krista Holder said. "I've never known happiness."

The news was broken to her by a sister-in-law Mrs. Thomas Holder, of Iselin, on the way here.

Relatives met the young bride at Idlewild but didn't tell her immediately of the death of her husband, Frank Holder Jr., 24. They also asked reporters who met the bride not to mention it.

Mrs. Thomas Holder said her sister-in-law didn't break down when told the news.

**SUSPECTED TRUTH**  
Earlier at the airport, she appeared composed while photographers took her picture. But a few moments later, apparently suspecting something had happened to her husband, she became hysterical as she was helped into an automobile.

Holder died of burns suffered Dec. 18 in an explosion at the Cornell-Dubilier Corp. in South Plainfield, N. J., where he was employed.

A day after the explosion, Mrs. Holder gave birth to a daughter, Evelyn, in a small town near Frankfurt, Germany.

The young bride had ever since her husband left Germany last year following a three-year tour of duty with the army.

She was present for the first time at a Kremlin New Year's celebration.

Party chieftain Nikita Khrushchev took a back seat and had nothing to say, but Bulganin lifted his glass six times in toasts.
