An Old Ladies Home is to be opened in Halifax on the 15th inst.

The Northern Light left Pictou for Georgetown at noon to-day with mails and passengers.

MR. ISAAC W. WADMAN is spoken of as a probable candidate to represent the western end of Ward 3 at the coming civic election.

The death is announced of William Johnston, the organizer and for years the Secretary of the "Reform Association" in Ontario.

A REGULAR meeting of the Benevolent Irish Society will be held in their hall this evening at 8 o'clock. John Hennessy, Secretary.

The plans and specifications for the public buildings at Regina are almost completed. The post office, the insane asylum, the court house, and the jail are all to go up this spring.

THE Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance is circulating petitions throughout the province for alteration in the Scott Act, requiring a three-fifths vote before it can come into operation.

A PUBLIC Temperance Meeting will be held in Scott's Hall on Wednesday evening next, under the auspices of Prince Edward Division. Rev. Mr. Whitman will be one of the speakers. The public are invited.

AN old soldier, who called himself a "manufacturer of dynamite," arrived in the night train Wednesday, and applied for lodgings to the Policeman, who gave him free quarters in the jail. He went to P. E. Island next day.

ON Tuesday (festival of the Epiphany) Bishop Cameron blessed a new bell for the church of Margomish, N. S. The mission of Merigonish, together with that of Vale Colliery, is under the efficient pastoral charge of the Rev. Dr. McGregor.

THE Pictou News says: "The Charlottetown overseers of the poor, had the impudence to send over here by the boat last week, an unfortunate man named Anderson of St. Stephen N. B., who is dying of consumption, and had to be taken in charge by our overseers. It was an inhuman act to turn a man in this condition, out of an hospital at this season of the year."

AN ENGLISHER CAPTURED.—Dominion Police Inspector Skeffington is to receive a reward of \$500 for shadowing John L. Mc Mahon, a New York absconder from St. John to Quebec, where he surrendered and finally consented to return to Gotham. McMahon left New York last August with \$20,000 belonging to the Leather Manufacturers' National Bank.

JOHN PATRIQUIN, of Lake Road, Tatamagouche, died a few days ago at the advanced age of 93 years. Mr. Patriquin was married at 20, and had consequently lived 73 years of married life. Mrs. Patriquin, who survives him, is now well advanced in her ninetieth year. There is perhaps few instances in this country of a couple living together in married life for 73 years.—Sun.

ST. JOHN, N. B.'s mortuary record shows that the number of deaths in 1884 was 645, an increase of twenty-one over the preceding year. Consumption carried off by far the largest percentage of victims. The death-rate among the aged was heavy, no less than 61 being between 70 and 80 years of age; 24 from 80 to 90, and 5 from 90 to 100.

MR. EDWARD RYAN, of the Charlottetown Herald, had a perilous escape from an untimely death yesterday forenoon. While on his way to attend a business meeting of the S. F. Association, he broke through the ice off Railway Wharf, and were it not for the timely assistance of other members of the association, there would be a vacancy on the staff of The Herald which it requires an able man to fill.

Another perilous escape was that experienced yesterday by Mr. R. M. Young, of the P. E. I. Railway. He was proceeding to Rocky Point on business; crossing the Three Tides he broke through the ice, and as the current was strong, he had great difficulty in saving himself. Mr. Young returned home alone wet, cold and exhausted, but is to-day, we are pleased to see, able to attend to business.

SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.—Last evening Mr. Dan'l Noonan, Hotel Keeper, with three children and a woman named Affleck, were driving from Centreville. Bed-que, to Summerside. On the ice off McDonald's Point they drove into a spring hole, and all were submerged. The cries of Mr. Noonan for help were heard by a farm laborer at McDonald's. He hurried to the scene and succeeded in saving Mr. Noonan, Mrs. Affleck, and two of the children, but the third, a bright boy of four years, perished. His body was recovered immediately after the accident, and taken on shore to Mr. McDonald's house, but every attempt to restore life was unsuccessful. The survivors of the accident had a narrow escape, and when rescued were unable to stand. The water in the hole was but five feet deep. Had it been deeper none would have been left to tell the tale.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Another Orange Outbreak in Newfoundland.

St. John's, Nfld., Jan. 9. Another Orange outbreak is reported from Carbonear district on Wednesday. While Dr. Richard Dunn, a Roman Catholic medical practitioner at Broad Cove, was proceeding on a sick call, he was overtaken by a mob who stabbed him in fourteen places.

An Informer Stabbed. New York, Jan. 9. Capt. Thomas Phelan, of Kansas City, who has been for some years identified with the Irish movement, was stabbed and dangerously wounded in O'Donovan Rossa's office to-day. He was said to have given away information of importance. Baker, the man who stabbed Phelan, is under arrest. Phelan will not likely recover.

Bismarck Checked. Berlin, Jan. 9. In the Reichstag to-day Bismarck was again checked. The Budget committee moved that the proposed credit of 150,000 marks for African colonization be reduced one-third. The motion was adopted notwithstanding Prince Bismarck's opposition.

N. B. Local Election. Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 9. Glasier, the candidate of the Local Government, was elected by a large majority to-day. He had lately resigned owing to a scrutiny being brought before the court to unseat him.

Eleven Persons Poisoned. Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 9. Eleven persons were poisoned by drinking coffee with Rough on Rats in it to-day. Two of them died. The others are recovering.

Encouraging Reports. London, Jan. 10. Reports from the Wolasey expedition are very encouraging. It is thought their way will not now be difficult as in the past.

Four Boys Drowned. Pottsville, Pa., Jan. 9. Four boys were drowned here this afternoon while skating on the ice, which was not strong.

Current Notes. Floods have been doing damage in India. The land reform agitation has spread to Wales. A number of failures are announced in England. Oats in Montreal are in better request and firmer. The wheat market the world over continues to improve. The election of Mr. Taschereau, M. P., for Beauce, is to be contested. German travelers in West Africa complain of being hampered by British officials. The Spanish consul-general at Quebec is to receive subscriptions for the earthquake sufferers. It is thought that the French forces will be removed from Keelung and concentrated in Tonquin. The marriage of Princess Beatrice to Prince Henry, of Battenburg takes place next spring. Paris anarchists are making arrangements for a meeting at the burial of Louise Michel's mother. Mr. Errington, the unofficial representative of Great Britain at the Vatican, has arrived at Rome. The Australian Presbyterians are protesting against the annexation of the New Hebrides by France. Gen. Hobelev writes to the Russian newspapers denouncing England and urging Russia to acquire India. Statistics of the iron and machinery trades for the past year go to show that while the decrease in price has been about 15 per cent., the volume of business has not materially decreased. The secretary of the United States Iron and Steel Association thinks no improvement will come till higher prices are reached in the grain markets.
