

Ch'town's Natal Day Parade To Be Enlarged This Year

Charlottetown's traditional Natal Day parade, set for August 2, will be enlarged this year to include representatives of the armed forces, in addition to members of city council, the police and fire departments. The parade to the new Holy Redeemer Church will include personnel from the three visiting ships in port over the weekend.

The public will get a chance to see the new Centennial float for the first time Sunday. The float features replicas of both the Provincial Building and the Fathers of Confederation Memorial Building and will also form part of the parade.

Lieutenant-Governor W. J. Macdonald and aides will attend the parade, which will be held in honor of the occasion.

MAYOR TAKES SALUTE
Mayor Macdonald will be the first to see the parade and will march past city hall, where the salute will be taken by Mayor W. Gaudet and city council members.

The parade will travel to the church by way of Queen and Upper Queen Streets and return by Spring Road, Easton, Great George, Kent and Rochford Streets to the Navy Barracks.

The Royal Canadian Armoured Corps Band, the P.E.I. Recce Band and the Sea Cadet Band will participate.

The Armored Corps Band will play on the Charlottetown Hotel verandah during a reception and buffet luncheon for visiting service personnel, who will be guests of the city.

The P.E.I. Recce Band will play at the traditional Natal Day concert at Victoria Park at 7:30 p.m.

More Selective Aid Urged For Depressed Areas Here

"A policy of taking work to the unemployed wherever they may be cannot be reconciled with the requirements for national economic growth," reads in part a study released by the Atlantic Provinces Economic Council. "Some areas, it continues, are so unsuitable for industrial development it would be useless or excessively costly to make the attempt."

The report was prepared by Professor Thomas Wilson, a Glasgow University specialist who was named by the Atlantic Provinces Research Board in 1963 to undertake a study of national tax incentives and other policies as they related to regional development.

Professor Wilson suggested specific grants for starting up the expanding industry in this area, hit a small island and cap-sized, reports said.

The Island premier expressed a fear that the tax exemptions so far as this province is concerned only serve to direct industry elsewhere to "designated areas."

Professor Wilson contended that it was a mistake to consider only areas of high employment as best qualified for government aid. The proper procedure, he said, was to insure that areas chosen were large enough to include within them likely centres of industrial growth.

Provincial governments can help to attract industry by provision of factories for rent or sale, both on isolated sites and in factory parks, he added, and loans from government agencies can also assist development, especially in the case of small firms.

Toronto Man Draws Fine

A charge of impaired driving brought a fine of \$100 and costs or 10 days to Winston Monroe MacLeod of Toronto when he appeared in Magistrate's Court yesterday before Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC.

Roy James MacInnis of Bedford was fined \$50 and costs or 20 days when he changed his plea to guilty to a charge of driving while his license was suspended.

Four persons each received fines of \$20 and costs or 30 days for illegal possession of liquor.

Man Suspended In Drinking Case

Earl Christopher of Charlottetown was ordered to enter recognition of \$500 with two securities of \$250 each and given a two-year suspended sentence on a charge of being drunk and disorderly when he appeared before Magistrate A. J. Haslam, QC, in city police court yesterday.

James Carl MacCallum, Charlottetown, was remanded to July 31 on a charge of robbery with violence.

Ronald Johnston of Charlottetown was fined \$10 and costs or five days on a charge of dishonoring a firearm within city limits.

Zoning Change Proposal Here Is Dropped

A zoning change proposal for the Brighton area has been dropped by council, at least for the present.

Councillor Walter Cox withdrew a motion to introduce a by-law to allow an 18-unit luxury apartment dwelling to be built on the Power Estate. The present zoning by-law allows apartment dwellings of no more than four units to be built in the area.

The withdrawal action was taken when council met in committee of the whole following the noon emergency session of city council.

A spokesman said council thought it advisable to let the matter rest for now, in view of the study being made by the town planner.

The master plan for the city is expected to be completed early in October.

2 Jail Sentences Given On Forgery

GEORGETOWN — Lawrence Peter MacLean, Deception Marsh, was given two one-year sentences, to be served concurrently in Kings County Jail, for uttering forged documents, when he appeared before Kings County Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, at Georgetown yesterday.

MacLean had earlier pleaded guilty to uttering the documents, cheques in both cases. Informant was Edward Douve of Montague Town Police.

MacLean's previous record showed a two-year suspended sentence for theft and a two-month jail sentence for forgery. Magistrate Johnston dismissed the case of Lawrence Edward Burke, Cardigan North, charged with breaking a recognition, when the Crown failed to produce any evidence against him. The charge was laid by his wife, Rita.

The case of Wallace William MacPherson, Glen Martin, was adjourned for a week. MacPherson is charged with care of a motor vehicle while impaired.

Raymond Martin Griffin, Montague, pleaded not guilty to impaired driving and his case was adjourned to August 5 at Souris.
