

# Augustine Brilliant in Winning 3rd Masters

 AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—Arnold Palmer came off the floor again Monday and rallied with a withering streak of birdies to bring about a tie at 290 with his third Masters golf championship in an unprecedented three-way play-off with Gary Player and Dow Finsterwald. Palmer shot a four-under-par 68. Player and Finsterwald were tied at 71.

Down three shots in Player's first nine holes, the powerful young pro from LaBree, Pa., knocked in birdies on five of the first seven holes of the income side to turn the contest into a virtual rout. The finish was similar to that of Sunday when Palmer, his game on the verge of collapse, saved it with spectacular birdies on the 16th and 17th holes to bring about a tie at 290.

Player, the usually imperturbable defending champion from the 1959 PGA, shook his head in disbelief and declaring: "That 68. Player and Finsterwald were tied at 71."

Finsterwald seemed almost in a state of shock. In adding the 1962 Masters to the crowns he won in 1958 and 1960, Palmer established himself firmly as the king of present-day golfers. He has proved himself not only a superb craftsman, but a dogged fighter of the links with a knack for snatching victory from imminent defeat. He hits back hardest when he's hurt. The black stretch of Augusta National's 6,969-yard, par-72 course is rated the toughest by most golfers. Palmer played the black nine in 17 strokes under par during the tournament. The victory, worth \$20,000, sent Palmer to the head of professional golf's money-winning list and gave him the first leg of the modern grand slam—featuring the U.S. and British opens and the PGA—which he barely missed two years ago. He won the Masters and U.S.

With each major league now expanded to 10 clubs, the 20 opening days spread over a two-week period. Seven more will make their home bow Friday but Los Angeles will be home until April 17 and Milwaukee Braves play their first home game April 18.

The big names of baseball will not waste any time getting a start on the new season. Milwaukee will have the veteran Warren Spahn showing for victory No. 310 at Candlestick Park with Juan Marchal pitching for San Francisco Giants.

The new-look Chicago White Sox open at home against Los Angeles with Bill Gribb going for the Angels against Juan Pizarro.
