**Work Agencies
 Are Under Fire**

NIAGARA FALLS, Ont. (CP) — President Dave Archer of the Ontario Federation of Labor called Monday for an end to the exploitation of unemployed workers as fly-by-night employment agencies.
 A number of jobless, particu-

larly new Canadians, are falling prey to these agencies, Mr. Archer told the federation's annual convention.
 The agencies would put a man on their registration list for \$3 and then deduct as much as a month's pay if they got him a job. Others would hire workers for \$1 an hour and rent them out for \$1.50, he said.
 The fly-by-night agencies are staffed with inexperienced people with no knowledge or interest in employment problems, Mr. Archer said.
 "Their entire equipment usually consists of nothing but a desk, a phone, a telephone directory and no doubt a cash box."
URGES ACTION
 Mr. Archer called on the Ontario government to end such exploitation. He said the matter was left to the provinces after the federal government last year decided to rescind a regulation,

which would have outlawed employment agencies charging fees.

He also called for an increasing number of job opportunities for Canadians to offset the effects of automation and provide for the increasing population.

Unemployment in Canada is the worst in the English-speaking

world except for the West Indies, Mr. Archer said.

Mr. Archer expressed fear legislation may be brought down in Ontario implementing some of the labor-cutting regulations of the select committee on labor relations. The committee brought in 51 recommendations, some of them aimed at curbing union power.

But Labor Minister Charles Daly, speaking later, said he does not want to make drastic changes in the Labor Act to restrict either labor or management.

 Judge Parkinson, an uncle of coach Frank Clair of the Ottawa Rough Riders football team, disappeared Oct. 26 after leaving his court chambers for his nearby apartment. He had been reported seen in various parts of Chicago and in Indiana but the reports could not be confirmed.
 Finding of his glasses and both handle and frame of his umbrella near the beach strengthened a police theory that he may have fallen into the lake from a sea-wall and drowned.
