

# Relief Pitcher Dorish Turns Trick For White Sox

If a top-ranking relief pitcher can nail down a pennant, veteran Harry (Fritz) Dorish seems to be the man to turn the trick for the Chicago White Sox.

When Dorish appeared in the ninth inning Tuesday with the bases loaded and retired the side for a 5-4 victory over Washington Senators, it marked his sixth appearance in 12 games.

The victory left them securely entrenched in third place in the American League. The clutch hurling of Dorish has nailed down a number of those victories.

At the other end of the standings, Detroit Tigers absorbed their 12th setback in 14 tries to sink deep into the cellar spot they occupied last season. Lefty Maury McDermott of Boston Red Sox walked eight Tigers but held them to three hits to shut them out 2-0, stretching their scoreless streak to 16 innings.

George Kell, the third-baseman whom Detroit traded to the Sox last season, scored both Boston tallies.

Little Bobby Shantz drove in two runs and pitched eight-hit ball to edge Mike Garcia in a round duel Tuesday night as Philadelphia Athletics shaded Cleveland Indians 3-2.

St. Louis Cardinals ended Philadelphia Phillies' eight-game winning streak, edging the National League leaders 6-5 in a slugfest in which relief pitcher Kent Peterson walked home the winning run with the bases loaded in the seventh inning.

Chicago Cubs shaved the Philadelphia 1 1/2 games by whipping Pittsburgh Pirates 5-3 on two-run homers by Preston Ward and Randy Jackson.

Preacher Roe made his first start of the season, winning one for Brooklyn, curving the ball to a 5-1 victory over Cincinnati Reds. Ted Kluszewski's ninth-inning homer ruined the veteran southpaw's shutout.

Aided by four-baggers by Del Crandall and Jack Dittmer, Max Surkont pitched his third victory of the year at Milwaukee Braves whipped New York Giants 4-1.

Allie Reynolds struck out two men with the bases full in the ninth inning and New York Yankees went on to edge St. Louis Browns 7-6 in the 10th, to take over leadership of the American League from Cleveland.

A general free-for-all delayed the game in the last half of the 10th when Brownie catcher Clint Courtney singled and tried to stretch it into a double. Courtney singled into Phil Rizzuto, upsetting him.

Yankee Billy Martin followed by slugging Courtney. Both benches then moved onto the field and a free-for-all followed.

The game was delayed for 17 minutes when fans started throwing bottles onto the field.

## Dutchmen Win Opener In Allan Cup Finals From Penticton 5-2

KITCHENER, Ont. (CP)—Kitchener — Waterloo Dutchmen drove home three goals in the third period Tuesday night to take a 5-2 victory over Penticton V's in the first game of the Allan Cup hockey finals.

A capacity crowd of 7,353 saw the Dutchmen close strongly through the third period, as they have done all year, to win the first game of a best-of-seven series from a battling crew of Western champions.

The second game will be played here Tuesday night.

A tripping penalty to Don Johnston, one of five handed out to Penticton, was the turning point. And while the V's were short-handed the Dutchmen scored twice.

The Dutchmen held a territorial edge in the scoreless first period while the V's had a margin on play in the second when the teams divided four goals.

Keith Woodall handled 33 shots in the Kitchener nets while Ivan McClelland stopped 38.

Grant Warwick opened the scoring for the V's after 25 seconds of the second period. He came in fast from the blue line to golf home a long rebound that Woodall couldn't cover.

Two goals by Jack McKenzie, Kitchener right-winger, about five minutes apart, gave the Dutchmen a brief lead.

Willie (Scrap Iron) Schmidt tied it up at 16:50 with a rising backhand from about five feet out.

Al Buchanan sank the winner with a backhand at 9:10 of the third. Harry Pautka drove home a fourth goal for the Dutchies to make it 4-2 and Clare Martin counted on another screened shot at 15:09 to end the scoring.

The unbeaten grey son of Polynesian from Alfred Vanderbilt's barn has been the centre of attraction since he arrived Monday to run in the 79th Kentucky Derby Saturday. It was the same Tuesday as trainer Bill Winfrey took him out on the track with exercise boy Bernie Everson handling the reins.

Long before the big grey left his stall writers and photographers gathered to get a glimpse of the Vanderbilt flyer. Trainers and stable hands from surrounding barns dropped what they were doing and headed for the back stretch.

Among the spectators was Wally Dunn, who'll saddle Mrs. Gordon Gulberson's California-owned Correspondent Saturday. Correspondent is rated the Dancer's chief rival in the \$100,000 run for the roses.

Dunn saw the Dancer at Santa Anita, where he wintered, and wanted another look at the most talked about horse since Man o' War.

The champion, winner of 11 straight races, walked around the slightly damp mile track in 10 minutes and then jogged another mile in perhaps half that time.

One trainer remarked: "Now that my horse has seen Native Dancer, he won't eat for three weeks."

A boy galloped past on another grey, definitely a plater, and yelled: "This ain't Native Dancer."

Back to his stall went the Dancer, unperturbed by all the excitement.
