IN MEMORIAM

EUGENE MACDONALD GLOVER

There passed away suddenly of a heart attack at Ocean Falls, B.C., on Feb. 16th, 1953, Eugene MacDonald Glover, aged 48 years, formerly of White Sands, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. David Glover. He left P. E. Island at the early age of eighteen. He made several visits back to the homeland, the last being eight years ago when he returned from service overseas where he served in the Italian theatre and other war centres. He spent almost three weeks with his sister and family at Murray Harbor. The other sisters joined in a family reunion and welcome home where they spent a very happy Christmas before his return to B. C.

He was a man who possessed a friendly nature, a cheerful disposition and a pleasing personality which made for him many friends.

He was a highly respected citizen in the land of his adoption, an ardent bowler, and a valued employee of the company where he worked as was evident by the beautiful floral tributes and letters of sympathy received.

A funeral service was held at Ocean Falls in the United Church where the members of his bowling association and the Loyal Order of Moose Lodge attended in a body and had the honor of carrying their departed brother to the boat en route home for burial.

He leaves to mourn his passing three sisters, (Catherine) Mrs. C. W. Hawkins, Murray Harbor; (Anna) Mrs. W. A. Acorn, Millview; and (Gertrude) Mrs. E. B. Maxwell, Dorchester, Mass.; also one brother, John, at Murray Harbor.

His funeral service here was held Feb. 28th from the United Church and was largely attended. Rev. D. W. McPherson officiated and took as his text "The Lord stood with me and strengthened me" from 2nd Timothy 4th chapter 17th verse. A duet "The Old Rugged Cross" a favourite of the departed was sweetly rendered by Mrs. Louis Herring and Miss Vera Beck. The choir sang, "There's A Land That Is Fairer Than Day" and "Abide With Me". His casket was draped with the Union Jack amid the profusion of lovely flowers in loving remembrance of one who served in peace and war. His remains were gently laid to rest in the family plot in Murray Harbor Community Cemetery.

French Civilian Captives In North Korea Released

PARIS, (AP) — Fourteen French civilians have been released after nearly three years of captivity in North Korea and are heading home by way of Moscow, the French foreign office announced Friday.

The release was unofficially interpreted here as a sign that the Soviet Union intends to convert into hard action at least some of its words of peace with the West and possibly as portending a more general agreement on prisoners of war in Korea.

The Frenchmen, among them the charge d'affaires in Seoul and a correspondent of the French press agency, were set free just a week after Soviet foreign minister Molotov promised to intervene with the North Koreans on their behalf.

Word that the civilians have at last regained their freedom was received by the foreign office in a brief message from its ambassador in Moscow, Louis Joxe. He had been given the news by the Soviet foreign ministry.

The foreign office withheld official comment except to say that it was a piece of good news which would be welcomed especially by anxious members of the imprisoned persons' families.

Molotov also has offered to help bring about the release of British civilians held in North Korea, but action on the British group has not been announced. The Russians have informed the British, however, that two of the nine civilians for whom Molotov promised to intercede are dead and that the North Koreans say they know nothing about a third.

Hudson Motor Company Report

DETROIT, (CP) — Hudson Motor Car Company had consolidated net income of \$8,307,847 in 1952, after all charges, or the equivalent of \$4.15 a share on the 2,001,902 shares outstanding at year-end.

This compares with a net loss of \$1,125,210 after a tax carry-back of \$2,183,485 for 1951.

Sales volume, including defence contracts, totalled \$214,873,980 compared with \$186,050,832.

Purge Underway In East Germany's "Sea Police"

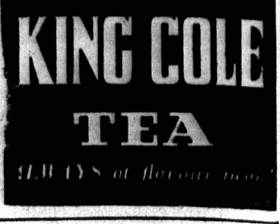
BERLIN, (AP) — The U.S. high commission newspaper Neue Zeitung reported Wednesday that a large-scale purge is under way in East Germany's "Sea Police," reported to be the nucleus of a future Communist German navy.

The newspaper said the sea police chief, Waldemar Verner, had ordered 3,000 "unreliable" transferred from his force to East zone army units. This would cut the force considerably. Recent reports have estimated it at upwards of 10,000 men, with a fleet mostly of torpedo and speedboats and minesweepers.

EXPERTS EXHIBIT
