TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] The Republican Convention.

CHICAGO, June 4. The Republican National Convention was called to order at noon to-day by chairman Sabin, of the National Committee, who also named Mr. Powell Clayton, of Arkansas, as temporary chairman. The independent in the Convention objected to having a candidate named and proposed Hon. John R. Lynch, of Mississippi. There was great excitement when the balloting showed that Lynch was elected to the temporary Chairmanship by a small majority. Clayton was the nominee of the Blaine party. The routine work of the Convention then progressed, various Committees being appointed, and divers matters being referred to them. The day was completely occupied with routine affairs. At 4.15 p.m. the Convention adjourned until 11 to-morrow. In the Convention to-day Leslie W. Russell, of New York, presented the following which was referred to the Committee on Resolutions: "Resolved, that the Committee on resolutions be, and are hereby directed, to give a hearing to a Committee appointed by the Irish National League of America to present a memorial to this Convention on the subject of ownership of realty in the United States by foreigners."

Sherman Will Not Accept.

CHICAGO, June 5. Gen. Sherman has telegraphed to ex-Senator Henderson saying he would not accept the Presidential nomination if offered or serve if elected. The general impression this morning is that the chances of the nomination of some man not heretofore prominently mentioned have been increased. The names most frequently mentioned are General and John Sherman and Gresham. In case of a break in the Blaine column it is understood Nebraska will go to John Sherman. Eastern delegates are determined to adhere to Senator Edmunds, and as they are divided in opinion it is likely their strength will be divided between Sherman, Graham and Hawley for some time. Gen. Henderson was elected permanent chairman of the Convention this morning.

The London Aquarium Burned.

LONDON, June 4. The East London Aquarium, at Bishopsgate was burned this morning. Of the collection of wild animals, some were safely removed from the burning structure; others it was necessary to shoot, and some were burned. Among the latter were lions, bears, jackals and monkeys. The two Russian bears, however, were rescued. The roaring of the burning beasts was something terrible. The collection of curiosities of Marwood, the notorious hangman, was consumed.

Baby Farming and Baby Murdering.

PHILADELPHIA, June 4. Twenty-one bodies of infants were to-day exhumed near the Baby Farming Institution, under the supervision of Miss Nivison, at Hammon, N. J. The greatest excitement prevails as it is now clear that the children have been fearfully neglected. The case is now in the hands of prosecutor Thompson, of Atlantic County.

It is announced that Mr. Trevelyan, Chief Secretary for Ireland, has introduced into the House of Commons, a bill to simplify those provisions of the Land Act by which tenants are enabled to purchase their holdings. The State will furnish the whole of the purchase money, where the price is considered fair and the security offered is good, repayment to be made in 33 annual instalments, with 3 1/2 per cent. interest. The amount that may be advanced by the State in any one year is limited to 25 million dollars, and the entire sum to be devoted to the purchase purpose must not exceed one hundred million dollars.

The Guelph, (Ont.) Mercury says:—The reports which come from different parts of the country stating that the plum trees have been destroyed by the severe frost of last winter are applicable to this neighborhood. Nurserymen and gardeners here state that there is scarcely a plum tree in their orchards which has not been killed. Between this and the ravages of black-knot there will be no crop worth speaking of this year, and the lady folks will have to depend on some other fruit for their preserves.
