### Mrs. Cath. Rodgers Dies In Charlottetown At The Age Of 96

The death occurred at the Charlottetown Hospital on Thursday, September 13th, 1956 of Mrs. Catherine Rodgers, widow of the late Michael Rodgers after an illness of two weeks.

Mrs. Rodgers was born at Abram's River, N.S. on March 16th, 1860. She spent most of her life in Digby later coming to live with her son Reginald at Borden. Despite her advanced age she had full possession of all her faculties until the end. She was a faithful member of the Roman Catholic Church, devoted to her religion, and died fortified by the last Rites of her church.
