Household Hints.

Ox Tail Soup.—Cut the tail in seven or eight pieces, and fry brown in butter; slice three onions and the same of carrots; fry them in the pan after removing the ox tail; place the onions and carrots, after frying, in a cotton bag, with a bunch of thyme; drop it into a soup pot with the ox tail; cut up two pounds of lean beef, grate over it two carrots; place it in the pot; add four quarts of water, some pepper and salt, boil five or six hours; strain it; thicken with a very little flour; boil ten minutes longer, and serve hot.

Fricassee Rabbit (white).—Clean, cut into joints, and soak in salt water for an hour. Do not cook the head or neck. Place in the saucepan with a very little cold water—not quite enough to cover it; add one small finely chopped onion, one pinch of mace, one grated nutmeg, some pepper; use at the rate of a quarter of a pound of fat salt pork for one rabbit, cut the pork into thin slices, and place it in the pan with the rest, cover it over and stew until tender; remove the joints—and thicken the gravy, add half cupful of cream or milk, one well beaten egg, stir it in a little at a time; a small lump of butter; boil up once, thicken with a little flour, and remove from the fire; add the juice of half a lemon, stir well, then pour the gravy over the joints; serve hot. Same (brown).—Clean, cut into joints, and soak for an hour in salt water; do not use head or neck; season each piece with pepper and salt; dredge with a little flour, and fry in butter until brown; remove the rabbit from the pan (leaving the grease), and place it in a saucepan; pour over enough lamb or veal broth to cover the joints; add a finely chopped onion, one tablespoonful of walnut cut-up, a bunch of sweet herbs, one pinch of cloves, same of allspice, and a little cayenne pepper; cover closely; let simmer for 25 minutes; then lay the joints in order upon a heated dish, strain the gravy, return it to the pan, and thicken with flour; add a lump of butter, and the juice of half a lemon; pour the gravy over the joints; serve hot.
