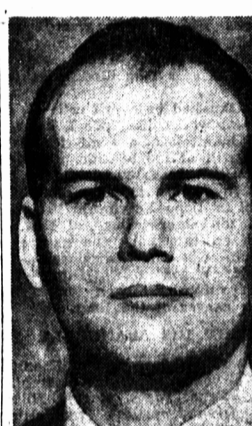
The buffeting threw many of the passengers into the aisles and others out their heads as they hit the ceiling of the craft.
