The organist, George A. Thompson, played the Bridal March as the bride entered the church. Perfect Parfait Pairing
Rice And Strawberries

In Copenhagen, Denmark, our U. S. rice growers and millers, whose product recently has been making news all over the world, put on a top promotional show. It was designed to introduce and explain rice exports at the 6th International Food Exhibition held in Denmark's colorful capital. The overall U. S. exhibit was sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

U. S. rice rose to the occasion with an exhibit staffed by a specially trained Danish home economist, and a group of Copenhagen girls, who conducted a continuous 12-hour rice cookery during the 10 days of the exhibition.

One of the favorite dishes served was the Rice Parfait which we are proud to present today.

Measurements level; recipes for 6 RICE PARFAIT

4 c. sweetened cooked rice (follows)

1 1/2 c. heavy cream

3 drops red food coloring (optional)

1/2 tsp. almond or vanilla extract

2 tsp. sugar

1 (1 lb.) pkg. frozen strawberries

Reserve 6 whole half-thawed berries for garnish

Refrigerate sweetened cooked rice (see below) until chilled

Whip cream with food coloring, extract and sugar, and set aside 1/2 c. for topping. Fold remaining cream into chilled sweetened cooked rice.

Serve in deep dessert dishes

as follows: Layer in rice and strawberries alternately. Top with 1/2 c. reserved remaining whipped cream. Garnish: a half thawed strawberry.

Sweetened Cooked Rice: Cook 1-3 c. white rice in 3 c. water by any preferred method, adding 2 tsp. granulated sugar to cooking water. Rice should absorb water. Makes 4 c. sweetened cooked rice.

Tossed Salad of Mixed Greens with Green Lima Beans

Calves Liver Slices with Avocado Slices, Saute Parslief Potatoes

CALVES LIVER SLICES WITH AVOCADO SLICES, SAUTE

1 1/2 lb. calves or beef liver (cut in slices 1" thick), skin removed

1 tsp. salt

1/2 tsp. pepper

1/2 c. butter or 1/2 c. butter or margarine

2 medium-size avocados

12 sprigs watercress

6 lemon wedges

Dust liver with salt and pepper. Heat half the butter in 10" frypan; saute liver slices 6 min. altogether over moderate heat, allowing 3 min. to a side. Meantime, in second frypan, cook avocados.

To do: Remove skin, cut in halves, remove pit, and cut each avocado-half crosswise into 1/2" slices. Put remaining butter in second frypan, and in 8" slow-

KITCHENER (CP)—Canadian women worked harder a century ago but at least they were secure. Una Abrahamson, author of the book God Bless Our Home, said yesterday.

Mrs. Abrahamson, one of 12 Canadian women to receive a centennial award, spent five years researching the book on the 19th century Canadian housewife.

She told a luncheon at the Central Ontario Exhibition here that the woman of the 1800s was important to herself and was the centre of family life.

"She may not have made a single decision during her entire life, nevertheless, the home revolved around her."

"Today, professionals are researching the problem of the lonely woman—the woman who, with the help of household gadgets, always has her work done."
