50th Anniversary Of East Point Church

This is the third building which was erected in the community. The first was begun in 1832 and the members met on July 17, 1833 to organize the regular Baptist Church.

In 1857 a second church was begun to accommodate a growing membership and was completed in 1864. That building with its tall spire and commanding position on the hilltop overlooking the community, served until the present building was constructed to accommodate a still expanding membership. The church records show the day of dedication was fine and the services were largely attended.

At that time a neat and elegant pulpit was presented as the gift of Mr. D. Schurman of Bedouin. A well finished morocco pulpit Bible was presented by pastor and wife (Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Gardner).
