2nd Conjoint Assembly Is Concluded At Centre

"You cannot practice 1956 medicine in 1966," one doctor said in explaining why modern doctors believe in belonging to the College of General Practice of Canada. The College believes in continuing education for doctors and insists its members follow the plan of spending 100 hours in approved postgraduate study every two years.

The college has just completed its second conjoint scientific assembly for the benefit of the three chapters in the Maritime Provinces and members of the planning committee along with the national president and members of the guest faculty met with reporters in Confederation Centre.

Dr. D.E. Hunt, St. Catharines, Ont., national president, said it was one of the aims of the College to provide better medical care for the people of Canada through insistence on continuing education. Dr. Norman Glen, Amherst, N.S., explained the purpose of the assembly was to bring to the doctors the best available advice on scientific subjects and it was easier to do this when the three chapters combined.

During the sessions which started Monday morning all case presentations were made by the family doctor involved and later discussions were participated in by specialists. It was done in a variety of ways through the use of case histories, films, slides and in some instances by the presence of the patient.

LONDON (Reuters)— Anglo-Spanish talks on the future of Gibraltar were adjourned Tuesday night amid reports that Spain is dissatisfied with a British proposal that their legal differences be taken to the World Court at The Hague.

Informal sources said the Spanish delegation maintained that the World Court proposal runs counter to a General Assembly resolution in December which called on Britain and Spain to solve their differences over Gibraltar in bilateral talks.

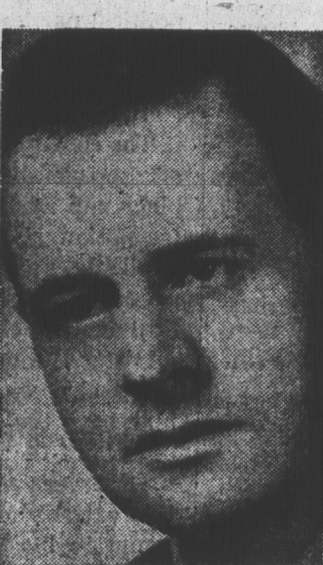
