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Mark Twain on Kin in Sin.

Mark Twain, in introducing Mr. Winston Spencer Churchill at his first lecture in New York was warmly received, and spoke in his best vein, saying:

"For years I've been a self-appointed missionary to bring about the union of America and the Motherland. This ought to be a union of friendship and esteem and fellowship, an alliance of the heart which should permanently and beneficently cement the two peoples together. I've warmed this mission of mine up with compliments to both peoples wherever I've been. They ought to be united. Behold America the refuge of the oppressed from everywhere (who can pay fifty dollars admission)—anyone except a Chinaman—standing up for human rights everywhere, even helping to make China let people in free when she wants to collect fifty dollars for them. And how unselfishly England has wrought for the open door for all. And how piously America has wrought for that open door in all cases where it was not her own.

How generous England and America have been in not compelling China to pay exorbitantly for extinguished missionaries. They are willing to take produce from them—firecrackers and such, while the German must have monuments, and any other boodle that is lying around. They've made Christianity so expensive that China can't afford German missionaries any more.

And how gallantly we went to the rescue of Cuba, struck the chains off and set her free—with England at our back in an attitude towards European powers which did us good service in those days, and we confess it now. Yes, as a missionary I've sung my songs of praise; and yet I think that England sinned when she got herself into a war in South Africa which she could have avoided, just as we have sinned in getting into a similar war in the Philippines. Mr. Churchill's father is an Englishman; by his mother he is an American; so doubt a blend that makes the perfect man. England and America; yes, we are kin. And now we are also kin in sin, there is nothing more to be desired. The harmony is complete, the blend is perfect.

Wars That are not Noticed.

It is remarkable how little attention is paid by the world at large to the frequent civil wars of the Spanish-American Republics. The great battle fought in Colombia the other day in which 600 men are reported to have been killed and many hundreds wounded would have created world-wide interest if it had occurred in Europe, Africa or Asia. Why is it that people in general care so little about the wars of Central or South America? It is probably due to the fact that no one expects any important complications to arise from them. The European powers have tacitly recognized the Monroe doctrine and never interfere in these little quarrels. Some people believe that

land hunger will eventually cause the United States itself to make these wars an excuse for assuming control of some of those southern countries, and Cecil Rhodes is reported to have suggested not long ago that it would be to the advantage of the world at large if the greater part of the South American continent were annexed to the United States. Germany has been credited with a desire to obtain colonial possessions in South America and if the Germans should ever feel strong enough to defy the Monroe doctrine South American wars might be given as much space in the newspapers as if they occurred on any other continent. But it is scarcely likely that Germany will ever risk a war with the United States even for the sake of owning vast colonies in South America—Montreal Star.
