

Greece Devalues Currency 50 P.C.

ATHENS, Greece, (AP) — Greece declared a bank holiday Friday and devalued her currency by 50

per cent. The drastic cut in the value of the drachma—from 15,000 to 30,000 to 81—was announced in a radio broadcast Thursday night. Bankers were ordered closed Friday while the devaluation was being carried out.
