Heavy Docket In County Court

An exceptionally heavy docket confronted Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet at yesterday's sitting of the Queen's county Magistrate's Court.
Under the Highway Traffic Act seven speeders were fined \$10. An eighth was fined \$15.00 for speeding through built up areas. Most of the above offences occurred near such centres as Cornwall, Hampton, and Crapaud. Two were apprehended near Parkdale.
For permitting unlicensed drivers to operate their vehicles, two persons were fined \$10, and costs each. Three others were fined \$5.00 and costs for lack of or defective equipment on their vehicles. Another, for failing to have a proper registration was fined \$5.00 and costs and a similar fine was imposed on a person charged with driving on the wrong side of the highway.

TEMPERANCE ACT
Two offenders, charged under the Temperance Act for possession of seven speakeasies in a place other than their residence, received fines of \$20.00 and costs. A person charged with intoxication in a public place was fined an identical sum. For possession of an intoxicating liquor, not purchased at the vendors (moonshine) two accused were fined \$25.00 and costs or 30 days each. The case of a resident of Murray Harbour, charged with criminal negligence causing bodily harm to the person of another was adjourned until June 1. Mr. E. Trainor appeared for the accused.

Charged under the Criminal Code for making a disturbance in a dance hall at New Glasgow, two persons were fined \$20.00 and costs or 30 days. For failing to stop at the scene of an accident an offender was fined \$25.00 and costs or 30 days.
Three local men, charged with theft of goods under a value of \$50.00, were remanded to May 28, in the case of impersonating a Peace Officer, the evidence of four witnesses for the prosecution was heard and the case adjourned to May 25. Mr. L.P. O'Donnell appeared for the accused and Mr. J.P. Nicholson for the Crown.

DIJON, France (Reuters)—Young reservists fired pistols and threw a grenade as they swarmed from a troop train near here Wednesday in a demonstration against being sent to fight in Algeria. No one was injured.
So far the train, which left from the Paris area Tuesday for Marseille, has been brought to an abrupt stop four times by the soldiers pulling the brake cord or disconnecting the coach couplings. Each time the train has stopped, most of the 1,000 reservists aboard have dispersed to the nearest bars.
U.S. POPULATION GAINS
WASHINGTON (AP)—The census bureau Monday estimated the population of the United States on April 1 at 167,440,000. The bureau said this was a gain of 16,306,000, or 10.8 per cent, compared with the 151,132,000 on April 1, 1950 when the latest census was taken. A total of 4,091,000 births last year was a record high.
