Canadian-American Final In International Curling

PERTH, Scotland (CP) - A Canadian - American final for the international curling championship developed here Thursday afternoon after both countries posted victories in the semi-final round.

Terry Braunstein of Winnipeg handed Scottish champion Chuck Hay a curling lesson in the key game of the playoffs, defeating him 8-4 in a game that Canada controlled from the opening stone.

But Summerville of Wisconsin had little trouble eliminating Dr. Borje Holmgren of Sweden 14-5 in the other half of the semi-final round. Norway and Switzerland were eliminated in the preliminary five - game round robin.

The two finalists meet Thursday night with Canada trying to make it seven victories in a row since the annual international event started.

Wings Bomb Bruins; Habs Defeat Toronto

DETROIT (AP) - A five-goal first period triggered a Detroit scoring spree and carried the Red Wings to a 10-3 victory over Boston Bruins Thursday night, increasing their National Hockey League lead to three points.

It marked the first time since March, 1953, the Red Wings, who have won 12 straight on home ice, scored that many goals.

Ten Red Wings notched the tallies. Norm Ullman sparked the Wings with a goal and four assists to move into second place in the NHL individual scoring race.

Boston goalie Jackie Norris, who turned aside 33 shots when the Bruins surprised Chicago 2-1 Wednesday, had to make 47 saves against the charged-up Wings.

The Red Wing first - period goals came on power plays and another while the Bruins had the man advantage.

OPENED SCORING Gordie Howe opened the scoring at 2:05 when Norris reached out with his stick to try to intercept a pass only to see the puck trickle into the net.

After Phil Martin, Paul Henderson and Del Fonteyne rushed into the Boston zone as the Bruins got careless during a power play, Fonteyne backed the puck into the net after Norris stopped Henderson's attempt.

Both Floyd Smith and Gary Beraman tallied within 40 seconds shortly before the 13-minute mark to complete the first-period barrage. Smith's goal also came on a power play.
