

# First Legislation Appears For Celebrations In 1964

The first legislation prepared for the coming Confederation Centennial celebrations here in 1964, was given second reading and agreed to in committee of the legislature yesterday afternoon. Hon. J. David Stewart was the promoter with Lorne Monkley, Summerville in the chair.

Mr. Stewart explained that the bill will set up as a corporate body the committee of citizens which are charged with the main responsibility in making arrangements for the extensive celebrations expected in that year.

One stated object of the committee is to make and carry out all necessary arrangements for the organizing of a suitable and effective celebration of the centenary of the first meeting of the Fathers of Confederation at Charlottetown and the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary thereof.

The members of the committee will serve without remuneration. The management, administration, all business and affairs and the control of the revenues and expenditures of the committee will be vested in board of directors expected in that year.

One section provides that the committee will be financed, the bill states, by grants from the government of Prince Edward Island, authorized by an appropriation from the legislature for the purpose, and by such gifts or grants as may be received from time to time.

One section provides that the government may by proclamation fix a day or days which shall be a public holiday for the celebration of the Centenary of Charlottetown meeting of the Fathers of Confederation.

A bill to amend the county court act was promoted by Hon. Melvin McQuaid with Harold Smith, Pownal in the chair as it was approved in committee of the legislature.

It is a technical amendment which concerns the necessity of proving the incorporation of a company when an action is brought into court in the name of a partnership or company.

On the expenditure side a debt charge of \$2,222,203 took a heavy bite out of the ordinary revenue. Health expenditures amounted to \$3,515,793 and welfare and labour to \$1,965,413.

EDUCATION SPENDING

Education accounted for \$2,706,352 with the item for teachers' salaries and supplements running to more than one and one-half million dollars.

The Supplementary grants to school districts amounted to \$779,215 and transportation and tuition to \$129,552.

Other items of ordinary expenditure included \$221,799 for administration of justice, \$94,900 for legislation \$86,176 for agriculture, \$54,165 for fisheries and \$2,166,967 for highways and natural resources accounted for \$245,650.

Public works accounted for \$112,324, tourists development for \$115,927, \$79,436 for refunds of revenue (this included \$47,951 for gasoline tax rebates), \$419,962 for "other current expenditures and \$568,451 on general government.

A Charlottetown boy, Kenneth MacInnis, 15, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Percy MacInnis, 218 Hillboro, was flown to the Montreal Children's Hospital from the Charlottetown General Hospital on Wednesday afternoon. Dr. Jack Sweeney accompanied him.

The boy is suffering from a rare condition known as portal hypertension, a blockage in the circulation of blood vessels from the intestines to the liver. He had a similar operation last summer.
