undertaken as chief task the extension of the U.S.S.R. boundaries proper, and even what is more devastating, the Russian sphere of influence, Hungary, Austria, East Germany, Albania, Estonia, Latvia, China and Korea have all been absorbed into Russia proper or the Russian sphere. Korea having been delivered from domination by Japan, Russia was allowed that portion of Korea north of the 38th parallel for re-settlement, and forthwith engineered the attack on South Korea by the North Korea.

years for commercial use, representations should be made to the Federal Government to use this Province as an experimental area.

Mr. MacDonald said that transportation is a continuing worry to the people here, especially the efficiency of our mainland connections. He said the Abegweit was a credit to the Government and he found no fault with the quality of the service "but what might be called the quantity." He said the latter falls far short of our needs. A specially built boat was needed to carry the overflow automobile traffic and the Government should continue pressing for such a boat until our request is granted.

Ferry Crossings

He noted that the service is inadequate because there are not enough crossings at Burden and asked particularly for an earlier morning crossing to land people at Tormentine around eight o'clock in the morning. He said this would be a great convenience for travelers as the present first crossing means Islanders and leaving visitors arrive on the mainland much later and this results in shortening their travelling day.

Unnecessary Talk

Another suggestion which the speaker advanced met with approval on both sides of the House when he expressed the hope that the session would not be prolonged by unnecessary discussion as has sometimes happened in the past. "The people expect us to be businesslike and to despatch their business expeditiously."

Mr. MacDonald, who was chosen to second the Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne, noted the absence in this Province of water power or coal deposits with which to develop energy. He said that if we had the power we would be able to compete in many lines of production with Central Canada. He maintained this would work a complete transformation in our economic outlook and in the standard of living of the people.
