

Insect Pest No. One Is Wireworm

MONTREAL (CP)—The wily wireworm, a farm pest that lurks in the soil, is more vulnerable than he is believed to be.

But in the opinion of Dr. A. P. Arnason of Ottawa, he still rates as western Canada's No. 1 insect crop pest and the different species of the family prey on tobacco, potatoes and other crops elsewhere in the country.

Part of his defence is that he lives around under the ground for five or six years and is a larva before transforming into a beetle. But new insecticides, used to treat the grain and roots that the wireworm nibbles, can kill three-fifths of the wireworms in a field.

CROP SAVING
Dr. Arnason, who is a federal government entomologist, said today that the wireworm is responsible for a crop saving worth some \$5,500,000 in Saskatchewan in 1953 and another \$5,000,000 in Alberta.

The Maritimes are troubled particularly with the European wireworm.

The insect came in for discussion Thursday at the 10th International Congress of Entomology.

Dr. R. H. Burrage of the federal entomology laboratory at Saskatoon said that while effective chemical seed treatments are most important recent developments in wireworm control, more fundamental studies now are needed.

It now is necessary to find out the effects of weather, food, natural enemies and soil conditions upon the worm and also to study the different species which attack the seed and stems of grain crops.

Pair Charged In Ontario Shooting

WARKWORTH, Ont. (CP)—Clifford Brough, 24, a hired farm hand, and Robert White, 18, were charged Tuesday with murder in the shooting of Roy Rogers, 29, of this village, 35 miles southeast of Peterborough.

Police said the shooting occurred in the kitchen of a farm owned by the dead man's brother, Wesley Rogers.

White was a boarder there and Brough worked on the farm. They claim they believe the shooting was the climax over an argument about the disputed ownership of a farm.

(Top Record-Holder in Masters' Individual Championship Play)

East dealer.
East-West vulnerable.

The bidding:
East South West North
Pass 2 NT Pass 3 NT

Opening lead—six of spades.
South has a typical two no-trump bid, denoting a balanced hand with 22 to 24 points. North's raise to three notrump is standard.

South won the jack of spades with the king and played a low diamond to the king, on which East showed out, disclosed the 4-1 diamond break. After playing a diamond to the queen, declarer took a heart finesse which lost to West's queen. The score was duly entered as down one, South winning only the eight high card tricks he had started with.

We have to grant that South had unusually bad luck with both the diamond division and the heart finesse. His method of play

Capt. W. B. Thompson said the children were as "good as gold" and promised he would drop them off in London, where the Dutch consul will help them to reach their mother.

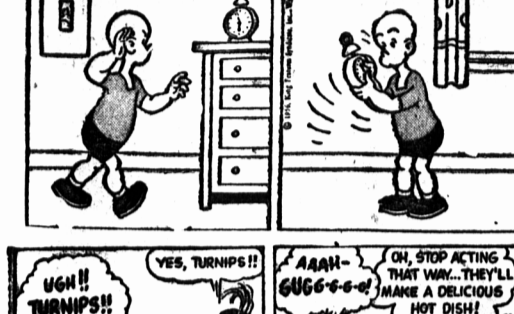
