DR. DESOLA, Rabbi of the Hebrew Congregation in Montreal, has died at New York, at the age of fifty-seven years. Dr. Desola was one of the most prominent Hebrew divines and the author of several works, displaying great literary ability and research. His remains will be brought to Montreal for interment.

"THE largest steam whistle in the world," says the N. Y. Sun, "may be seen on St. John Street." It was made for what we are told, is "the largest saw mill in the world," owned by Gilmore & Co., on the River Ottawa. It is about the size of a flour barrel, being 27 inches long and 20 inches in diameter. It is made of cast brass, and cost \$500.
