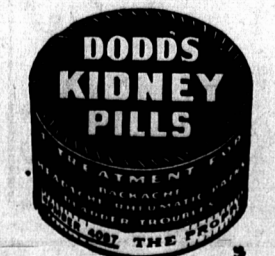
MacNeill - DesRoche Wedding
