British Told To Examine Market Here

### Contractor Wins Case In Moncton

OTTAWA (CP)—Contractor Jacob Mark of Moncton, N.B., Monday won a ruling from the Supreme Court of Canada for \$21,300 extra reimbursement from the City of Moncton on a 1952 sewer contract.

Mr. Mark claimed that he was obliged to do extra work not called for in the original specifications of a contract to lay a sewer along West Main Street and Miller Road.

Mr. Justice C. T. Richard in the Supreme Court of New Brunswick had found him entitled to the extra compensation but the appeal division reversed the decision.

### Jet Tanker Makes Record Flight From S. America

WASHINGTON (AP)—Gen. Curtis Lemay and a record-setting 11 F-4U fighter airplane team Wednesday rocketed a giant jet tanker plane from Buenos Aires to Washington in 11 hours, five minutes and eight seconds of a second.

The time for the 5,204 miles was sensational and it set a record for later crews to shoot at. This was the first non-stop jet flight between the Argentine and United States capitals.

Lemay and his men flew the Boeing KC-135 tanker transport from Latin America's springport to North America's late autumn at an average speed of 469.5 miles an hour.

At Washington National Airport they received a hero's welcome. Pilot Lemay received the Distinguished Flying Cross from his superior, Gen. Thomas D. White, air force chief of staff. Lemay is vice chief of staff.

The members of the KC-135 crew also were decorated for their demonstration of a swift global mobility. They also showed convincingly that the KC-135 could make an excellent aerial operations headquarters in the event of an emergency. It has

all the communications facilities such a headquarters would need. This same tanker transport crew left Westover Air Force Base, Mass., Monday afternoon and deliberately flew a long course to the outward bulge of Brazil and then down to Buenos Aires to demonstrate the tremendous range of the KC-135. BET NO-FULL MARK. In doing so it set a distance record for non-refueled jet aircraft of 6,325 miles, flown in 11 hours, two minutes and 31 seconds. Wednesday's goal was not a distance mark but the establishment of a speed record between the two capitals which would not be demolished easily.

PLOT SMASHED  
BOGOTA, Colombia (Reuters)—A plot to overthrow the ruling military junta and restore exiled dictator Vustavo Rojas Pinilla has been smashed, the government announced Monday. Pinilla was forced from power in May after weeks of political tension and riots throughout the country.

### Admit Price Fixing Charge

TORONTO (CP)—Seven firms pleaded guilty Monday to fixing prices for conveyance and power transmission equipment during a 20-year period ending in 1952. The firms are Link-Belt Limited, United Steel Corporation Limited, Jeffrey Manufacturing Company Limited, Foran Limited, Bond Engineering Works Limited, Webster-Smiths Limited and Stephens-Adamson Manufacturing Company of Canada Limited.

Mr. Justice R. W. Trevelyan of the High Court of Ontario will hear representations from lawyers for the firms before passing sentence. Maximum penalty for each firm is a \$100,000 fine. The charges were laid after an investigation by the director of investigation and research of the federal justice department which led to hearings in Winnipeg and Ottawa in 1955 by the restrictive trade practices commission. A Toronto grand jury in September, 1956, returned a true bill charging all seven firms to stand trial.
