

Brooks Beaten By Bucs; Mantle Powers Yank Win

PITTSBURGH (AP) — With Frank Thomas belting a three-run homer to clinch a five-run first-inning outburst, Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the second-place Brooklyn Dodgers 8-5 Wednesday night.

The Dodgers scored three of their runs in the ninth inning as they knocked Ted Munger out of the box but he got credit for his third victory in five decisions.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Mickey Mantle and his homer-hitting mates powered New York Yankees back on a winning track Wednesday night as the American League leaders overwhelmed Washington 12-2.

Mantle slammed his 33th home run of the season to establish a personal record and shoot him nine games ahead of the pinstriped Babe Ruth set by blasting 60 over the fences in 1927.

CINCINNATI (AP) — Ted Kluszewski and Gus Bell hit homers to pace Cincinnati Redlegs to a 8-2 win over Chicago Cubs Wednesday night.

Gene Baker, Cubs' second baseman, was struck in the left temple by a pitch by Johnny Klippstein in the fourth inning. He was hospitalized with a severe laceration. He also spiked himself in falling to the ground and four stitches were required to close the wound.

Ted Williams Draws Cheers From Fans

BOSTON (AP) — Remorseless Ted Williams drew loud acclaim Wednesday night from a near-capacity crowd at Fenway Park in his first appearance since the spitting episode which cost him the heaviest fine in major league history.

When the Boston Red Sox slugger was announced in the starting lineup over the public address system, a shouting ovation followed. Earlier in the day some of the fans had begun fund drives to help Williams pay his \$5,000 penalty.

A faint trace of the boos which had sent Williams on the most recent of his saliva attacks Tuesday were muffled Wednesday night by his reception from the majority of the "family night" crowd.

Williams, 37-year-old slugger, forgot the extra-curricula spitting which cost him a record \$5,000 fine Tuesday and spent his emotions in a tape-measure homer for the appreciative "family night" crowd.

The blow landed some 20 rows beyond the 420-foot mark in right field.

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP) — A 27-year-old native of Shediac, N.B., George Gallant won the annual Queens Elizabeth Day race here Wednesday. His time was 32 minutes 45 seconds.

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Giants will be invited to move to the Borough of Queens to a proposed television and sports centre to be built atop the Pennsylvania Railroad's Sunnyside Yards in the Long Island city area.

A. Edward MacDougall, vice-president of the Queens Chamber of Commerce and a director of the Long Island Railroad, said a formal invitation will be forwarded within a few days.

MacDougall proposed a 50,000 to 75,000-seat new Polo Grounds. Parking for up to 20,000 cars in the proposed new centre would be included. It would be financed by private capital.

The Giants are considering a move out of the Polo Grounds.
