Union Leaders Promise To Clean Out Corruption

WASHINGTON (AP) — Trade union leaders in a series of speeches marking Labor Day Monday night renewed pledges to drive corruption out of their ranks.

President George Meany of the AFL-CIO said the American people can count on his organization to help in the housecleaning. "So far as we are concerned," he said in a speech prepared for radio delivery, "there is no room in the labor movement for those who betray their trust, for those who embezzle union funds for their personal enrichment, for those who make common cause with gangsters and racketeers, for those whose shameful misdeeds serve to bring the entire trade union movement into disrepute."

It was a day off for most of working men and women in the United States, the last summer holiday of the year. Factories and offices were empty while the beaches, parks and highways were filled. More than 1,200 persons, including many labor union leaders, attended the annual Labor Day mass in Washington's Shrine of the Sacred Heart.

FIGHT ENEMIES
Meany, in his speech, had this to say about Senate investigation of labor racketeering: "But let me make it crystal clear that the AFL-CIO will fight to the last ditch against any attempt by enemies of labor in Congress to capitalize on the investigation for the purpose of fastening further restrictive legislation upon the entire trade union movement."

President David J. McDonald of the United Steelworkers issued his annual Labor Day message in Pittsburgh, declaring the United States has failed to "meet the challenge of building good human relations."

He said this failure is damaging the American position of leadership among free countries. President Eisenhower said: "It is fitting that we pause to pay tribute to the skill and strength of our working men and women. In their hands and minds is the power if our growth and the

promise of continuing achievement."

Senator Irving Ives (Rep. N.Y.) referred to testimony before the Senate rackets investigation committee of which he is vice-chairman and cautioned that activities of shady characters in organized labor could bring on punitive legislation from Congress next year.

Fisheries Minister Predicts New Leader Will Be Premier

During the Conservative convention on Tuesday night, the Prime Minister was introduced by Hon. J. Angus MacLean, Minister of Fisheries. Mr. MacLean recalled that during the Federal campaign he had made the prediction that Mr. Diefenbaker would become the next Prime Minister of Canada and following this thought, he felt sure the new leader of the Conservative Party on Prince Edward Island would become the next Premier of the Province.

Mr. MacLean said, "Mr. Diefenbaker is here in a different role than that held during his last visit to Charlottetown. He is in the role of Prime Minister of Canada and to date has given

this country magnificent leadership. "Already he is numbered among the great statesmen of the World," he added. He reminded the Prime Minister that the four members elected by the people of Prince Edward Island in reality won the election, for without them the party would not have enjoyed a majority of the popular vote. The Fisheries Minister complimented those who were responsible for arranging such a large convention. He termed it one of the best that he had ever attended, and reminded party supporters that it was through their working together they were able to win the Federal election and it would be through the same measures that the Provincial election would be won.

Must Triple Our Science Grads

FREDERICTON (CP) — Prof. Robert Love of the University of New Brunswick education department says free university education should be provided for all students capable of taking it. Addressing a City of Fredericton dinner for directors of the Canadian Education Association Monday, Prof. Love said Canada, to remain competitive as a free nation, must triple her present 40,000 engineers and 20,000 scientists and provide at least 10 times as many technicians as she now has.

He said the answer to this scarcity is to get more capable youth into higher education. At present only six out of 100 entering the school system graduate from university while statistics show that 25 out of every 100 have the ability to do so. State scholarships for top students provide government and industry with the educated men and women so urgently needed, he added.

He said every boy and girl, with a means test if necessary, should be guaranteed a university education, the only restriction being that he do satisfactory work.

GUARD AGAINST FLY MONTREAL (CP) — The Montreal General Hospital has begun inoculating 750 doctors and nurses

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with vaccine to protect them against Asian flu. Hospital officials said the anti-flu vaccine was obtained from a drug company which imported it under licence from the United States. The supply, however, is limited to the 750, half the hospital staff.

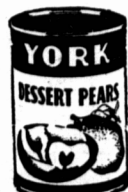

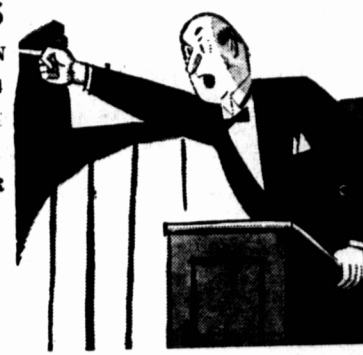
