WHO KILLED KING CHARLES?

There is an old riddle still asked in England, says a London paper. "Where did the executioner of Charles I have his dinner that day? And the answer is: 'He had a chop at the 'King's Head' in Westminster."

But there is still another riddle about that execution. "Who did chop off King Charles' head?" An answer that has never been satisfactorily answered.

When Charles II. came to the throne, among the twenty-nine people tried for bringing about the death of his royal father was the man, William Hulet, accused of having struck the fatal blow.

And yet, of all those twenty-nine he was the one man who escaped the death sentence.

Before the execution of the king, Hulet had been a sergeant under a Colonel Hewson. Three days before the execution the colonel sent for thirty-eight of his men, including Hulet, and after swearing them to secrecy, asked who would volunteer to be the king's executioner. He reward being 100 pounds and promotion.

To a man they refused, and that seemed an end of the matter as far as that regiment was concerned.

But one of the thirty-eight men, in giving evidence afterwards, stated that, when watching the execution, he recognized Hulet by his grey beard, despite the mask he wore, and by his voice when he fell on his knees and implored for mercy of the king before beheading him.

After the execution Hulet was promoted to the rank of captain lieutenant, and in his regiment he was henceforth known as Father Greybeard.

Another witness at the trial against Hulet swore that nine years after the execution Hulet confessed to him that he had performed the duty of headman. Hulet at once denied this, and claimed most strongly that if the opportunity was granted him he would be able to prove an alibi for the time of the execution.

A further witness, Colonel Axell, himself condemned to death, stated Hulet and a man named Wright delivered the fatal blow, and Hulet picked up the head to show the crowd.

Hulet himself, in giving evidence, swore that for refusing to behead the king, he with nine other sergeants, was imprisoned, and pleaded that they might be brought forward to support him.

The jury to a man brought in a verdict of "guilty," but for some mysterious reason, almost immediately the court had him reviewed without giving any explanation.

So the executioner of Charles I remains unknown to this day.

OBSERVING THE SUPREMACY OF THE CROWN

A curious survival of mediaeval custom is witnessed in London on Lord Mayor's day. This is an official visit of the Lord Mayor to the law courts. In olden times the Lord Mayor arrived in a chariot of state with sword-bearer, mace-bearer, chaplain and gorgeously liveried coachman and footmen. The arms have been changed, and the visit is now paid to the high court; but the spirit remains, for the Lord Mayor opens his term in the Mansion House with a ceremonial involving recognition of the supreme authority of the crown.

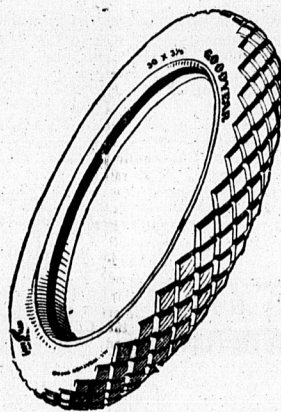
NO EXTENSION OF LOBSTER SEASON.

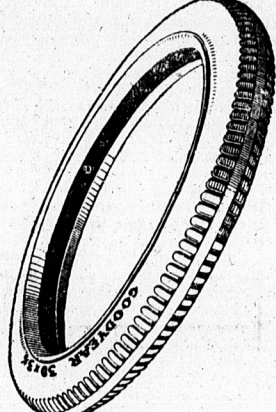

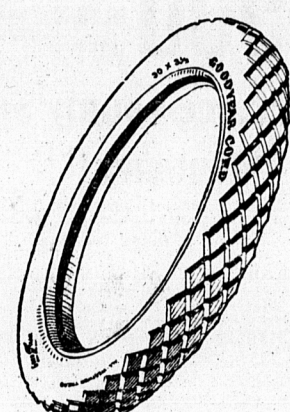

BRETONNEAU DEFINED EPI- THERIA.

It is a hundred years since Bretonneau made the discovery of diphtheria. The malady which at various times has broken out in deadly epidemics costing thousands of young lives, is not really so modern. It was known to the ancients as the "Egyptian Evil," and appeared in frequent epidemics both in the British Isles and on the Continent during the 17th and 18th centuries, generally being confused with scarlet fever the two diseases going under the name "Canker and rash." But it was Pierre Bretonneau, of Tours, who first identified the symptoms in diagnosis and defined the disease in the celebrated treatise laid in 1827-28 before the French Academy of Medicine. The famous Tours doctor also gave the disease the name of Greek derivation, by which it is now known in medical textbooks throughout the world.

Since the comparatively recent discovery of an anti-toxin, the disease has been robbed of much of its terror.

CHINESE MOON FEAST.

The Chinese feast of Moon Cakes which falls on the 11th of September, is the day when all good Chinamen must eat moon cakes. The festival lasts for a day and a night and is celebrated by the eating of cakes made in the shape of the moon and liberally sprinkled with all sorts of seeds. All the Chinese grocers sell packages of these cakes, and the very poorest Chinaman considers himself bound by the faith of his fathers to purchase at least one package. The greater number of cakes purchased the greater is considered the purchaser's respect for the night's chief luminary, and some very black fate is believed to be reserved for the Chinaman who fails to eat a cake before the festival is over. This doom is expected to fall upon him before next Moon Cake Day.
