IN MEMORIAM

WILLIAM JOHN HARRINGTON
There passed peacefully away at his home in Spring Valley on Saturday, February 21st, William John Harrington, in his 69th year. He was born in Spring Valley, November 25th, 1884, the son of the late William Henry and Ellen (Lockhart) Harrington.

His illness, extended over a period of one year, the latter part of which was attended with much suffering. Through it all, he displayed remarkable patience and resignation to the Divine will, being tenderly cared for by his daughter, Cordelia R. N. His entire life was centered in his home and family and there, his outstanding kindness proved him to be an ideal husband and father.

In his chosen calling, he was a successful farmer, and loved the open air work of farm life in his fields, so closely associated with nature. His beautiful well-kept farm homestead testifies in no small measure to his ability and good management as a home maker.

The deceased was one of the district's most prominent and respected citizens - good hearted, broad-minded, an obliging and dependable neighbor, liberal to church and all charitable causes. Honest in his dealing with his fellow men, he stood high in public esteem - his word was his bond. His passing leaves a vacancy in the community but where he will be missed most is in the home. In politics, the late Mr. Harrington was a Conservative - an ardent worker for the party he espoused.

His funeral, which was largely attended, was held from his home on Monday, February 23rd. The service was conducted by his minister, Rev. R. W. Coupland, speaking from the text found in 1st Corinthians, 15-22. "For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive", the speaker brought a comforting message to the bereaved. The hymn, "Shall We Meet Beyond the River", was feelingly rendered in quartette by Messrs. Health Cassidy, Fred Parker, Parmenas Phillips and Tyndall Semple, with Mrs. Parker as accompanist. Hymns sung were, "The Lord's My Shepherd" and "Safe In The Arms of Jesus" with Mrs. Roy Brvnton as pianist.

The deceased leaves to mourn, his wife, formerly Maud Ramsay, Malpeque, two daughters, Ellen (Mrs. John E. Cousins), Park Corner, and Cordelia (Mrs. Russell) Ramsay, Cordelia R. N., Summerside, and one son, Keith on the homestead; also two brothers, James and Hiram, Spring Valley.

Palbearers were Charles Lockhart, Samuel Simmons, Heath Caseley, Stanley Ramsay, Leighton Harrington and Ivan Harrington. Interment was in St. Stephen's.

SMITHS FALLS, Ont. (CP) - Smiths Falls Rideaus will open their Allan Cup playoff battle against Saint John N. B., next week with two players well known to Saint John fans.

They are Dusty Blair and Eddie Mulligan, who played for Saint John Beavers last year in the Maritime Major League.

But the Rideau player to watch is left-winger Stu Smith, who led the Eastern Canada Hockey League scoring with 38 goals and 38 assists this season and won the league's most-valuable-player award.

Coach Hal Dewey's Rideaus finished second in the four-team league. But in the semi-finals they defeated Thuro, Que., winning four games and tying one, and took on the league winner, Pembroke, in the final. The nine-game series went to eight games before Smiths Falls won with a 5-2 record in games. One game was tied.

The club's top scoring threats are forwards Smith, Blair, Alf Webster and Johnny Murettich. Goalkeeper Johnny Craig made a fine showing through the ECHL playoffs.

Team captain Don Thomson heads the defence corps with Ray Trainor, Hal Rockburn and John Shedden. Other forwards are Jerry Moore, Connie Tudin, Archie Richardson, Gordie Scott, and Orval Gravelle.
