

LATER FROM MEXICO.

Atlisco Destroyed by an Earthquake!—The schooner Sarah, at New Orleans from the Brazos, 9th, states that the Fever was increasing.

Letters from the city of Mexico, October —, state that Atlisco, in Mexico, was entirely destroyed by an earthquake on the 23d October. Not a house was left standing.

A large portion of the inhabitants were buried in the ruins.

Serious damage was also done to the surrounding country in the villages and monasteries, many of which were overthrown.

Canales died at Ceralvo on the 4th inst.

Later from Santa Fe—Insurrection at Chihuahua—A Battle Expected.—By the arrival of traders from Santa Fe later dates from that quarter have been received.

Another insurrection had taken place among the Mexicans at Chihuahua, and the American residents there forced to fly, to escape being massacred, leaving much of their property behind!

Col. Easton was mustering a force to march against the insurgents, and a battle was shortly expected to take place.

On Thursday evening, after a short but severe illness, Mr. Theophilus Chappell, aged 65 years, the oldest native inhabitant of this town.—Funeral to take place from his late residence on Monday next, at 2 o'clock precisely.
