COAL DEALER COMMITS SUICIDE STRIKE AFFECTS HIS BUSINESS.

Henry C. Scheel, of New York, Unable to Endure the Financial Difficulties Confronting Him Shoots Himself and Dies Soon Afterwards.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—Believing he had been ruined by the soaring price of coal, Henry Scheel, a wealthy wholesale coal merchant, with an office at No. 11 Broadway yesterday afternoon emptied the two barrels of a shot gun which he had used in hunting ducks on Long Island into his breast, from the effects of which he died shortly afterward at the Hood Wright Hospital. The shooting took place at his handsome home, at No. 410 West 147th Street. When pressed for an explanation by Policeman Steppes, of the West 132d Street Station, who reached the house a few minutes after the shooting, Scheel, who was then dying, but conscious said:—"The coal strike has done it all. My troubles have been more than I could bear. Coal coal is at the bottom of it all."

Before he could explain further he lost consciousness. Mr. Scheel was well known in the coal trade, with which he had been prominently identified for a score of years, being considered a successful dealer. Since the price of coal began to rise he had complained that unless there was a speedy settlement of the trouble and a return to normal conditions, he would be seriously embarrassed. It is believed he had several large contracts to supply coal, which was made before the strike prices now prevail-

ing, and then sell it for less than one-fifth as much, giving a big loss to him, he being obliged to buy the coal at the exorbitant rate of agreement. He worried greatly over it, and it is thought that incessant brooding caused a temporary derangement of his mind. He did not go to business yesterday as usual. After breakfast he went out for a walk along Convent Avenue. Persons who met him say he seemed very morose. Returning to the house at noon, he had lunch with his wife and their three children, who had come home from school. At the table he was irritable. After lunch he kissed the children good-bye and placed a coin in their hands as they started back for school.

Going upstairs to the top floor he placed the gun to his breast, the butt end of it resting on a washstand. As the shot resounded through the house Mrs. Scheel screamed for help. The contents of the barrel, aimed for the breast, because of the nervousness of Scheel, did not strike that vital point, but lodged in the left lung. It did not kill him. He heard his wife's scream of alarm. "Good-bye, dear wife," he cried, as loud as he could. She started upstairs when she heard the voice. Mary McKenna, a servant, went with her. They had not reached the top floor when the second barrel was fired.

HELENA, Mont., Oct. 4.—A Burlington west bound train and the Northern Pacific eastbound express met in head-on collision between Columbus and Park City. (Mont.) on the Northern Pacific track to-day. Two men were killed and seven injured, one fatally.

TWO BOYS FOUND IN DEATH.

CAMDEN, N. J., Oct. 4.—The bodies of John Coffin, aged 11 years, and Price Jennings, aged 14 were found in a field near Haddon Heights, a suburb to-day. The boys had been missing from their homes since Wednesday. Coroner Litchfield examined the bodies and found only superficial wounds.
