The Labor Problem.

DR. MCGLYNN'S lecture in the Market Hall last evening must have been a great treat to every thoughtful man and woman who had the pleasure of hearing it.

The labor difficulty of modern times could not possibly be fully treated in a lecture of even the length of two hours and a half. Therefore, we must not blame Dr. McGlynn if he failed to get at all the roots which contribute to its continued life and growth.

The abolition of the right to property in land, either by direct confiscation or by taking the owners to such an extent that they will be ready to give up their lands, and their "unearned increment" would remove the strongest incentive to human endeavor and confidence.

The best solution of the labor difficulty lies, in our opinion, in simple obedience to the command of God to man, to "subdue the earth" and "possess it." The men of modern times are deliberately shirking this duty for the performance of which they were created.

HALIFAX, May 30.—The herring fishery is reported fair to-day at Perce and Grand River, (Que.) but poor at Paspebiac; poor on the coast of New Brunswick, with the exception of Esquimaux, where the catch was fair.

Cod fishing is fair at Port Hood, Ingonish, and Cheticamp, C. B.; good at North Sydney; fair at Yarmouth, N. S. About 300 mackerel were taken in nets to-day at Canso, but no large schools were seen.

The boycott of the lumber firms in New York by the labor unions continues, and building operations in New York and Brooklyn are paralyzed.

No less than ten thousand pictures were rejected this year by the selection committee of the British Royal Academy. Most of them were hopelessly bad.

Pennsylvania, which was one of the first States to adopt the high license policy, has now doubled the license fees for retailers. They were formerly \$500, and are hereafter to be \$1,000.

At the home of a farmer named John Peters, living six miles from Leavenworth, Kan., he and his family, ten persons in all, were eating supper when a bolt of lightning passed through the dining room and rendered them all unconscious.

Two boys have just been dismissed from the high school at Dessau, Germany, for preaching socialism among their fellow-scholars. Another boy was sent away from the school some time ago for a similar offence.

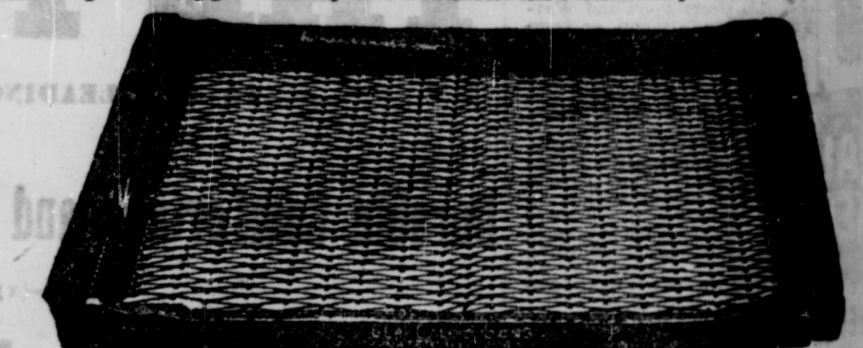
