Notes and Comments.

—The annual report of the civil service
examiners, just now issued, shows that the
total number of candidates examined during
the year at the entrance, qualifying and
promotion examinations was 1,082. These
in addition to the thousands examined in
previous years. We agree with the St.
John Telegraph that it is unfortunate that
the minds of so many young men have been
turned in the direction of the civil service
instead of business and industrial callings.

—At last the famous Beasport asylum
difficultly has been settled by the purchase
of that institution by the Sisters of Charity
for \$425,000. By their contract with the
Government the Sisters undertake the care
of the insane at the rate of \$100 a year for
ten years. For this sum they provide food
and clothing and leave medical control to
the Government medical officers, which is
a vast improvement on the old contract,
under the terms of which the Government
medical officers had no power whatever, and
could not discharge a patient as cured if the
proprietor objected.

—In the House of Assembly of Nova Scotia,
a few days ago, Mr. Webster, M. P. P., in
discussing the agricultural affairs of the
province made a strong plea for the establish-
ment of an experimental school for the study
of fruit culture in the great fruit growing
districts of the western counties. In the
Annapolis Valley alone there are said to be 250,
000 acres of land adapted to the cultivation
of fruit. The Cornwallis Valley is equally
suited for fruit culture. On these grounds
Mr. Webster contended that the Government
should assist and foster this great industry
by establishing one or more schools of instruction
at which the very methods of fruit culture
should be taught.

—It appears that during the last year
the vast sum of over \$140,000,000 has been
spent in the British Isles in alcohol drinks,
and even this is less by some \$300,000 than
the expenditure of the year previous. The
London Hospital speaks very strongly
on the undoubted evil effects of the enor-
mous consumption as follows:—Probably
three-fourths of this ocean of poison was
swallowed by one-fourth of the population.

We are not of those who stand for total
abstinence, and therefore we may speak
albeit more freely. Doctors, all doctors, know
now that alcohol is a powerful poison. In
large doses it kills quickly man, woman,
child or beast; in small doses it kills more
quickly, but not less surely. Alcohol of
any considerable strength is not a fit sub-
stance to be used as a beverage, any more
than an infusion of opium would be. It is
not a proper substance for use as a regular
food, except in its very weakest forms and
then not for all persons indiscriminately.

—Mr. Dupuy, the new premier, read a
statement of his policy in the Chamber of
Deputies. He said:—"The Government
is conscious of the difficulties of the present
situation, but full confidence in view of
the profound tranquility prevailing in the
country and its abiding faith in the Re-
public, which prove that the painful inci-
dents of the last few months have neither
checked the vigorous growth of the Repub-
lic, nor injured the country's traditional
reputation for probity and honor. One
lesson to be drawn from these trials is
that competency and assiduity are only to
be acquired by honest work and only ob-
tained by a regard for morality and the
preservation of self respect. This lesson
has gone to the national conscience. We
may, therefore, regard the future with
confidence. Every day universal suffrage
bring democratic inspirations into greater
accord with Republican institutions, and
the day is at hand when the defensive
ideals of France with the European
republic will render an agreement easier to
establish. As a means to hasten such a
result the public administration should act
with correctness and with consideration for
equity, and in order to secure the common
welfare. Citizens, I ask you to let the
country feel that parliamentary institutions
are following their normal course by resolute
attention to legislative business."

THE CANADIAN MAGAZINE.—The April
number of this new magazine is quite up to
the high standard of the first issue. The
articles are numerous, well chosen, well
written, and if Mr. Gordon Mowat, the
editor of the new venture, can maintain this
present degree of excellence he will richly
deserve success. The opening article,
"The National State," by Charles A. Stew-
art, is a thoughtful and agreeable contribu-
tion to a somewhat well-worn discussion,
but really contains something new. Stuart
Livingstone writes entertainingly of
"Bjornstjerne Bjornson"; Frank Yeigh
gives a eulogistic account of Ontario's new
Parliament buildings, with copious illus-
trations; Mr. Longley, a Nova Scotia
Cabinet Minister, sends the recent coal
monopoly policy of his Government. But
the piece of resistance of the number, as
far as it is concerned, is the able paper on
"British Trade and Imperial
Reciprocity," by Alex. McNeill, M. P.,
which we have already fully dealt with, and
which will commend the present issue of
the magazine to all intelligent Canadians.
There are other features of the number
that may be mentioned: Poems by Prof.
Chapman, Chancellor Rand, Mr. Tucker
and others; something about the famous
shrine of Ste. Anne de Beaupre; a political
sketch of Mr. Balfour, the Conservative
leader in the Imperial House, some agree-
able fiction, and a light corner for odds and
ends and literary notes, which promises
well. The number is well worth its modest
price of 25 cents, and as a creditable Cana-
dian venture should be warmly supported.

Provincial Legislature

House of Assembly.

SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS.

TUESDAY, April 11.

The House met at 4 o'clock and went
into committee of supply.

There was a good deal of talk over the
item of \$1,000 for enforcing the Canada
Temperance Act, and the Opposition pre-
sented the Leader of the Government for a
statement showing the amounts collected
for fines under the Act and the names of
the persons fined. The information asked
for was not furnished, however, and the
item passed.

On the appropriation for the Registry
Office coming up, Hon. Mr. Peters sub-
mitted a statement prepared by the
Registrar showing that the work in that
office had been allowed to fall behind during
the term of office of the late Registrar,
which statement occasioned considerable
discussion.

After recess the discussion was resumed,
lasting upwards of an hour, when the items
passed.

There was also considerable discussion
over the items for ferries and other
public works, and the Opposition protested
vigorously against being deprived of certain
information asked for early in the session,
which information it was necessary they
should have to intelligently discuss the
items under consideration.

House adjourned at 11 45.

WEDNESDAY, April 12.

House met at 11 45.

Mr. Arsenault asked what action the
Government intended taking in the matter
of a wharf at Lot 14, and a petition in
reference to same had been received.

Hon. Mr. McLean said the petition had
been received, and that the matter was
under the consideration of the Govern-
ment.

Hon. Mr. McLean submitted a state-
ment showing the expenses of the steamer
Southport during 1892.

Mr. Clow asked the Commissioner of
Crown Lands to lay on the table of the
House all papers and correspondence, also
a copy of an order in Council passed by the
Governor in Council for the sale of a
piece of land on Lot 63 to one Vere Beck
in February, 1893, said piece of land being
part of the purchase money paid thereon at
that time.

Hon. Mr. McMillan said the statement
would be tabled in a few days.

Mr. Sullivan asked the Commissioner of
Public Works if it is the intention of the
Government to open a road from
the old road on Lot 42 to
the shore, through the farms of Michael
McDonald and Angus D. McKinnon during
the present summer; also, if it was the
intention of the Government to repair the
road leading from Cable Head to Ashton,
Lot 42, during the present summer in
accordance with petition presented to the
House last session.

Hon. Mr. McLean said that in reference
to the first question it had been decided to
open the road; and in the second case the
matter was under consideration.

Mr. Bentley asked the Provincial Sec-
retary-Treasurer for a statement showing in
detail all payments made on account of the
public service in each department from the
31st December, 1892, and also what
amounts are due or owing by the several
departments of the public service up to this
date.

Hon. Mr. McMillan promised an answer
to the questions in a day or so.

Mr. Bentley asked the Provincial Sec-
retary-Treasurer and Commissioner of Crown
and Public Lands to lay on the table a
statement showing the amount of overdraft
in each of the banks to this date.

Hon. Mr. McMillan said the statement
would be prepared shortly.

The Act amending the Act incorporating
the town of Summerside was read a third
time and passed.

House then resumed committee of sup-
ply, Mr. Roberts in the chair.

News Notes.

An uprising in San Domingo is reported.

Probably the only woman customs
broker in this or any other country is
Hulda Grazer of Cincinnati. She is only
twenty-one years old, but already she
controls a large and profitable business.

It is stated that the United States has taken
vigorous action in regard to the outrages on
the American citizens at Marozon, in the
Turkish dominions, and the violation of the
mail of the United States legation.

Woman suffrage has just fixed the influ-
ence of women upon politics in Kansas.
During the recent registration a large num-
ber of the fair sex were duly qualified to
vote, the respective numbers of new voters
in the chief cities of the state being as fol-
lows:

In the elections which followed a few
days ago a large number of women came to
the polls—enough, it is said to have turned
the scale in favor of the Republican party.
That they did not remain at home is pro-
ved by the figures in Topeka alone, where
out of a total registration of 8,000 men
only 5,000 voted, while out of 3,800 regis-
tered women 3,200 voted.
