members proposed a system of "tighter control on the use of quantitative restrictions for balance-of-payments reasons."

It said members worked out a system for eliminating the "hard-core" of overseas restrictions during a maximum period of five years.

SPECIFIC PROPOSALS
After four months of negotiations at Geneva, the member countries made these specific recommendations:

1. Creation of a new body to be known as the Organization for Trade Co-operation to administer the GATT tariff concessions and trade rules. The OTC would have an assembly, an executive committee and a secretariat headed by a director-general.
2. Reduce responsibility for under-developed countries in living up to tariff and other concessions under GATT.
3. Ban use of export subsidies by any country in a way which would give it more than a fair share of world trade. No new or increased export subsidies would be allowed on non-primary products. All subsidies would be reviewed before January 1957 to see whether they can be eliminated.
4. Any country which wants to liquidate the bulk of farm surpluses on world markets should give advance notice and consult other countries exporting farm products. The GATT working party is to meet on this next summer.
5. Another working party will study tariff trends and recommend the convening of a tariff conference when it feels "progress in that field is possible." Existing tariff concessions under GATT are to be renewed for 2½ years until the end of 1957.

Sport Echoes From Prince County

The Aces failed to defend successfully their Maritime "B" hockey crown this year, and it looks as if conditions surrounding the series with St. Beil were not conducive to an Ace victory. The fact that they had to play their first game less than two hours after completing a tiresome trip to Edmundston, N. B. was against them. If the series were a best of three affair instead of total goals in two games, the Aces might have been able to overcome the handicap. But their victory in the second game, when they were well rested, was of no avail, as they could not make up the large 8-goal deficit of the first encounter.

It looks, however, as if intermediate "B" competition has stiffened considerably in New Brunswick since last year. Which reminds us to ask if anyone knows if there are any rules under which decisions are made as to the category of hockey teams, i.e. whether they belong to the intermediate "A" or "B" division, or can an intermediate club choose the classification it wishes to play in. During the winter someone, an official or ex-official of the M.A.H.A., we were led to believe, suggested that the Aces and Parkdale be placed in the intermediate "A" bracket as they were too strong for the other teams. It didn't exactly turn out that way, did it?

In any case it seems a poor way to decide such things. Could there not be some regulations, based on population of centres and import quotas, that would decide whether a given team belonged in the intermediate "A" or "B" division? Some such rules could also be drawn up to decide what teams should operate as intermediate "C" on Prince Edward Island also.
