

**WATER USE,
TV LINKED**

TORONTO (CP) — Flush toilets and household faucets may yet replace present ratings systems for television. Judy Garland's vintage movie 'The Wizard of Oz' ended at 8:30 P.M. **CPR Official
Not Optimistic
On Passengers**

MONTREAL (CP)—R. A. Emerson, president and chief operating officer of the CPR, said here he holds out little hope for the long-term future of the railway passenger business in the face of growing air and highway travel.

"Over-all, we can see no prospect of being able to attract to passenger trains people in sufficient numbers at prices they are willing to pay to defray expenses incurred," Mr. Emerson said in an address to the Canadian Club of Montreal.

As recently as 1930, passenger train revenues made up more than 27 per cent of CPR's railway revenues, he said. In 1964, they were less than 10 per cent.

In the short-haul market, the personal convenience of the automobile operating on rapidly improving highways, and in the long-haul market, the speed and efficiency of jet aircraft had resulted in substantial losses of rail passenger patronage.

SERVICES CUT

Thus, reductions of passenger train service have been unavoidable, Mr. Emerson said.

The problem was aggravated by the high degree of labor intensity in passenger train service and by steady increases in unit costs.

"On this premise, we believe it a disservice to the nation to disperse resources uneconomically, that is, to perpetuate operations which do not meet their costs and which, in the process, may impair the ability of other agencies to render proper, efficient service in this field," he said.

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP) — "I forgot" is an old excuse heard every day by everybody, but if an astronaut deep in space says it, well, he's in trouble.

How to remember not to forget?

Space officials worried about that have awarded Honeywell Incorporated, Minneapolis, Minn., a \$40,000 contract to find out why people forget.

The manned spacecraft center seeks assurance its astronauts, will remember the hundreds of small details needed to keep a spaceship flying and then bring it back to earth.

Believing the solution more complex than tying a piece of string around the astronaut's finger, the space agency asked the Minnesota firm to conduct a five-month study and to list possible memory - helping devices.

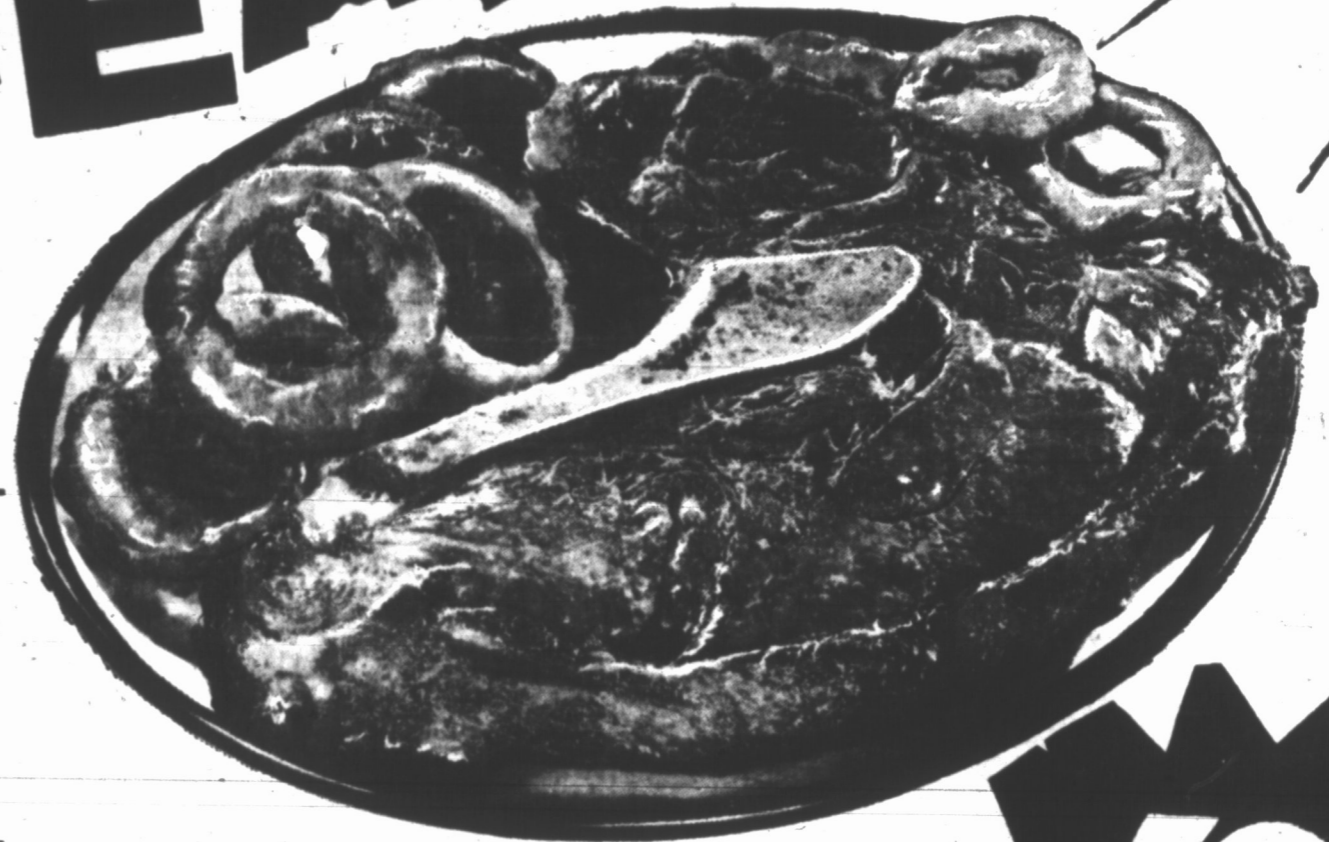

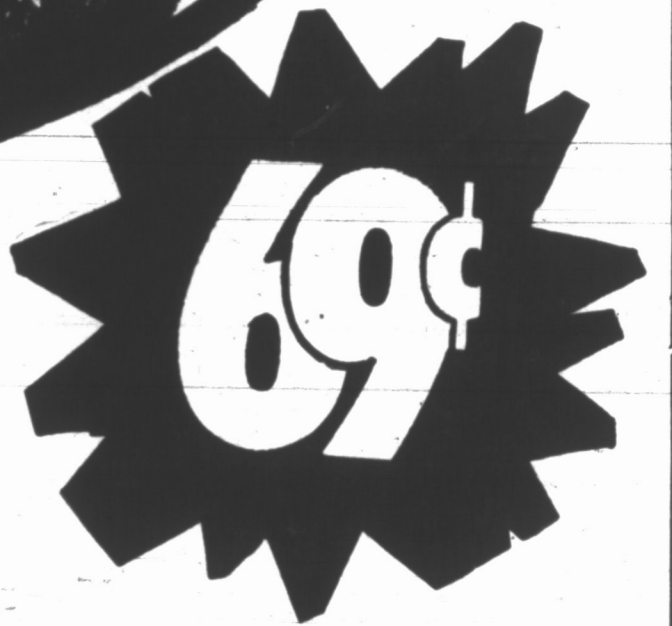
