Pope Sends Message To Chinese Catholics

VATICAN CITY, Jan. 20—(Reuters)—The Pope Saturday sent a message of encouragement to China's 3,500,000 Roman Catholics, urging them to hold firm against Communist persecution till "the sun shines forth again after the tempest and the storm." The message was in the form of an apostolic letter to archbishops, bishops and clergy and people of the Catholic Church in China. It said: "We have been greatly grieved to learn that in your nation the Catholic Church is represented and attacked as an enemy of your people, that its bishops, clergy, and nuns are frequently harassed, driven from their place of work or imprisoned in the free exercise of their office—as if the church were engaged not in the service of supernatural things, in instructing people to virtue and strengthening them in its practice, in providing education through its schools, in alleviating and massaging human suffering in hospitals and hospices for infants, children and old people—but rather in pursuing human interests and in seeking temporal domination."
