

A Woman's Wonderful Pluck.

A case of extraordinary pluck upon the part of a woman occurred at the Jefferson Medical College recently. The lady applied to have a tumor removed from her arm. The physicians decided to have the operation performed in the presence of the students, and when the hour for the clinic arrived the lady was invited into the amphitheatre. The doctors told her that they would have to administer ether, as the operation would prove so very painful. She refused to allow this to be done, and then the physicians tried to induce her to take a glass of brandy, which she likewise refused. They next offered her a glass of wine, but the lady simply waved it away, saying that she would be able to undergo the operation.

The doctors consulted for a moment and decided to take the woman at her word and go ahead. They bared her arm to the shoulder, laid her on her side and then buried the knife in the flesh cut a big gash over six inches in length pulling the bleeding pieces apart, removing the tumor, scraped the bone and then sewed the parts together. During all the time the patient never moved. Not a cry escaped her, and as she gritted her teeth her face became as white as a sheet. The physician and students looked on with amazement at the plucky woman and marvelled how she could endure the terrible suffering without a whimper. After the operation was concluded Dr. Brinton, turning to the 500 students, said: "There is not a man among you who could have stood this operation as heroically as this woman." Philadelphia Record.

Let The Boys Help.

Why is it that boys are allowed to sit around a house doing nothing while their overworked mother is struggling against nature and fate to do the work.

Only the other day we saw three large, able-bodied boys lounging about the house, not knowing what to do with themselves, while their mother, tired and pale, was trying to do the work for a large family and company also. Not a boy's work to help about the house? Why not? Is there anything about washing dishes that will injure him, or which he cannot learn to do well, or about making beds, or sweeping, or setting the table, or washing or ironing, or cooking a plain meal of victuals? On the contrary, there is much to benefit him in work the more important of which is the idea that it isn't manly to let the "weaker vessel" carry all the burdens, when it is possible for strong young hands to help. Most boys would gladly help in the house if they were asked to do so, and were taught how to do the work properly. Many a smart boy wants to help his tired mother, but doesn't know how beyond bringing in the wood or water, and shovelling a path through the snow. This done, she tells him to go and play while she plods wearily on. Not a boy's work! For shame! It is a positive harm to a boy's moral character to allow him to think it right to be idle while his mother is struggling under her burdens. Let the boys help, and those who can't get help "for love or money," as they often write to us, will see the troubles disappear.

The Shrinkage of Flannel.

To keep flannels as much as possible from shrinking and felting, the following is to be recommended: Dissolve one ounce of potash in a bucket of water, and leave the fabric in it for twelve hours. Next warm the water, with the fabric in it, and wash without rubbing, also draw through repeatedly. Next immerse the flannel in another liquid containing one spoonful of wheat flour to one bucket of water, and wash in a similar manner. Thus treated, the flannel becomes nice and clean, has barely shrunk, and not at all felted.
