

Arbitration Board Asked In Dispute

Following swiftly on the heels of Wednesday night's meeting, the hospital employees union yesterday requested the minister of labor to appoint an arbitration board to settle the current wage dispute.

The unions said they had denied a right to take a strike vote by the Minister from Henry Wedge, and their right to strike has also been denied on the basis that they are essential to the operation of the two local hospitals.

Asking for an arbitration board to resolve the dispute on wages, the letter asked that the board's decision be binding and final.

Senator Roebuck (L.—Ontario) said he personally favors a change in which the Senate would grant divorces by passing a resolution.

At present, both Houses of Parliament must pass a separate bill to grant a divorce to residents of Quebec and Newfoundland, the only provinces without divorce courts.

VIENTIANE, Laos (Reuters)—A battalion-strength assault by pro-Communist Pathet Lao forces on a neutralist position in the Plain des Jarres was repulsed after a three-hour protracted battle Thursday, neutralist reports reaching here said.

The two sides have been struggling for months for control of the strategic plain. Reports from Gen. Kong Le's neutralist headquarters said the attackers first laid down an artillery and mortar bombardment on the Ban Liang strong hold, then followed with an advance by one company of the Pathet Lao.

(Continued from page one) tips to photographers wishing to photograph the event. The company finds that a camera viewfinder offers no protection to the eyes against the dangerous infrared and ultra-violet rays.

The company suggests the use of metallic-silver filters of at least 6.0 density, which can be made of two thicknesses of exposed and developed black and white film. The filter must be used between the sun and the lens, telescope, eyeglasses, finders, or binocular. "To put the filter between the sun and the eye is hazardous," the warning adds.

Canadians who miss out on seeing this total solar eclipse will have to wait another nine years for the next one. Scientists have set the date at July 1, 1972, and say the shadow will pass over part of the Northwest Territories, northern Quebec and Labrador.

The last 20th century total eclipse in Canada will be visible in parts of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Hudson Bay on February 26, 1979.
