Political Meeting at Dundas.

Pursuant to notice, a meeting of electors was held in the Court House, Dundas, on the 25th inst. The meeting was organized by appointing Mr. William Wood, Chairman, and the undersigned Secretary.

Mr. Anear, the Independent candidate, gave an account of his stewardship, and explained the reasons why he had not carried out the platform on which he was elected.

Mr. John G. Scrimgeour, the candidate of the Opposition party, addressed the meeting, and endeavored to show the electors the absolute necessity of maintaining the Legislative Council as a protection to property holders.

Cyrus Shaw, Esq., M. P. P., in thanking the electors of Dundas for the generous support they had given him at the general election, referred to the fact that the present Administration had entered on their third term a position hitherto unattained by any party in the history of this Province.

CANNED GOODS.—Canned Mackerel are in good demand at full prices. Lobsters meet with a ready sale. Mackerel, per doz 1 lb cans, \$1.00 to \$1.15; Lobsters, per doz 1 lb cans, \$1.50 to \$1.55.
