It is announced that the Canadian Ministers now in England, with Sir Alexander Galt, will sail for Canada on the 9th of September.

It is rumored that an enterprising citizen of Montreal intends running a steamer from Annapolis, N.S., to England this fall, to carry apples.

The sum of \$1,500 has been voted by the citizens' committee of Montreal for the erection of a building for the display of Manitoba products at the forthcoming Dominion Exhibition.

It is rumored that a Joint Stock Company has been formed in Scotland for the purpose of purchasing timber limits on the Ottawa, and controlling the market.

News has reached Ottawa that small pox has broken out among the Indians and that they are dying in great numbers. Medical aid and medicine have been forwarded to the Indian Mr. Logue at Manawaki.

An English paper, commenting on the story that Mr. W. H. Vanderbilt has made an offer to Manager Gye, to come to New York in the fall, says: "Those who know Commodore Vanderbilt's untold wealth will understand that when he made up his mind to have anything done, which could be done for money, it was at once to be considered accomplished. His son, the heir to his father's fortune, has made up his mind to give New York next year, during the exhibition, the best Italian opera he can get for the opening of the magnificent new theatre which he has constructed. I am informed that he has made Mr. Gye a magnificent offer to bring the whole company, with all his *prime donne*, perhaps even including Mme. Patti, the whole of the orchestra and chorus, etc. If the sum I am told is really offered, Mr. Gye may surely be tempted to pass September and October in America.

At the last meeting of the Derroit Lime Kiln Club the secretary announced a communication from Obadiah Glassfoot, of New York, saying that he was an enthusiastic on the subject of discovering the North Pole, and adding that he would be perfectly willing to take command of an expedition fitted out by the colored race of America for such a purpose. He argued that the black man had never done anything to engrave his name on the scrolls of fame, and that this golden opportunity should not be permitted to slip away. 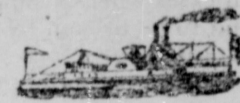
