HELSINKI, July 24 — (AP) — The United States eight-oar Olympic rowing champions were wind and dined by the Russians today. The young midshipmen from the U. S. Naval Academy drank vodka, ate caviar, hugged pretty Russian girls and toasted international friendship.

The Americans came loaded with gifts — chewing gum, candy, Olympic buttons and crew shirts. They came back with boxes of Russian cigarettes, bottles of cognac and neckties, along with koppeks.

They were presented with a handsome red velvet banner inscribed: "From the Russian Rowing Team In The XV Olympics." Yesterday the unbeaten U. S. crew won the eight-oar championship, with Russia a surprisingly strong second.

After the race the Russians asked the Americans to be their guests at their camp. On one wall were hung pictures of Stalin, Molotov and members of the Politburo—mammoth paintings in color.

Cleveland Indians Move Back Into Race With 4-2 Win Over Yankees

Cleveland Indians moved into the American League pennant race yesterday as big Mike Garcia turned back the front-running New York Yankees 4-2.

Garcia's strong performance enabled the Indians to divide the four-game series. His seven hits closed the gap to 5 1/2 games once again.

The victory also moved the Indians to within one percentage point of third-place Washington Senators and to within 1 1/2 games of the second-place Boston Red Sox. The Senators bowed 4-2 to Detroit and Boston dropped a 3-0 decision to Chicago. The Red Sox trall the Yanks by four games.

Meanwhile, in the National League, Brooklyn's pace-setting Dodgers split a doubleheader with Cincinnati, winning the second game 2-1 in 11-innings after the Reds took the opener 3-2. The second-place New York Giants trimmed St. Louis Cardinals 9-5 to pull to within 6 1/2 games of Brooklyn. Boston downed Chicago 3-1. Pittsburgh and Philadelphia were idle.

Home runs by Dale Mitchell and Joe Tipton and Johnny Berardino's two-run single accounted for Cleveland's runs against Tom Morgan and Ed Lopat. Yogi Berra batted in both Yankee runs on his 21st homer and a single. The victory was Garcia's 14th.

Erratic Lou Kretlow blanked the Red Sox on two hits as he turned in his first victory for Chicago. The

White Sox nicked Dizzy Trout for two runs in the third on two hits and two errors and scored their final run in the eighth on a double, walk and Sam Mele's single.

Walt Droppo clouted a two-run homer in the eighth, his 16th, to beat the Senators. Droppo's blast snapped a 2-2 tie. Previously Washington tied the count in their half of the eighth on a two-run homer by Mickey Vernon. Bill Wright was the winner and Randy Gumpert the loser.

Duke Snider's 100th major league homer enabled the Dodgers to shade Cincinnati in the second game of this twin-bill. Snider connected with one out in the 11th inning off relief pitcher Frank Smith. Ben Wade went all the way for Brooklyn, allowing only four hits.

Bubba Church stopped the Dodgers in the opener as he won his second game. Andy Seminick's two-run homer off Billy Loes in the sixth gave the Reds victory.

Homers also featured the Giants' triumph over the Cards. Home runs by Bobby Thomson, Davie Williams, Sal Yvars and Dusy Rhoads enabled former Card Max Lerner to breeze to his first victory over his former mates.

Four-baggers also provided Boston with its win over Chicago. Rookie Ed Mathews, clouted his 16th in the first inning and Sid Gordon homered in the third to put Boston ahead for keeps.

Six More Records At Olympic Games Broken

HELSINKI, July 24 — (CP) — A story of records within records and personal drama was written today into the 1952 Olympic Games.

Six Olympic records—two of them world marks—were shattered in Olympic Stadium where almost hourly the pages of Olympic history underwent revision.

The personal drama put Emil Zatopek and his wife into the limelight together. The Czech, with a gold medal already in his pocket for a record-breaking 10,000-metre run last Sunday put on a sensational stretch drive
