in five decisions.

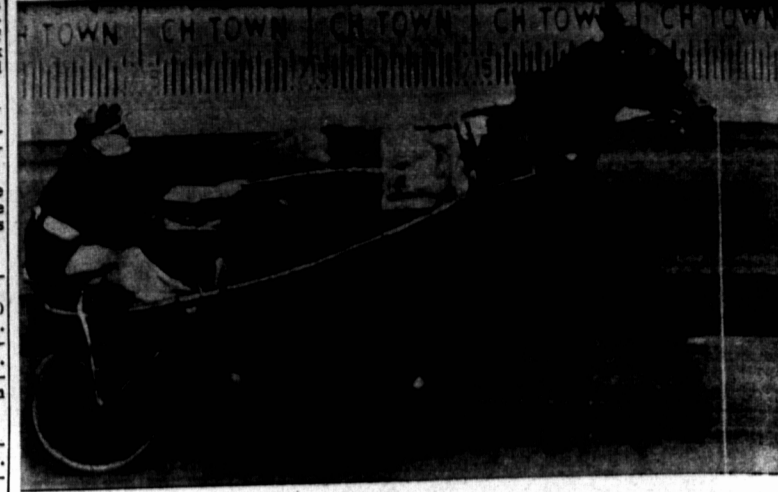

Fowler Claims He's Disgraced

CINCINNATI (AP)—Pitcher Art Fowler says he has been "disgraced" by being released by the Cincinnati Redlegs and that he intends to quit baseball.

Fowler, a 34-year-old right-hander, was released Wednesday by the Redlegs to Seattle of the Pacific Coast League after being waived out of the National League.

"Being waived off the Cincinnati pitching staff was the worst disgrace I have suffered in my baseball career," Fowler told newsmen. "You know how bad the team's pitching staff is and I know that I am better than some still on it."

"If I can't make the Red's pitching staff then I'd better quit baseball."

Fowler had a 3-9 record this year and was used mostly in relief.
