

T.B. League Urges Support Of Christmas Seal Campaign

In 1904 a Danish postman, Einar Høiboell, determined to assist his fellow-countrymen who were suffering from bone tuberculosis, organized the first Christmas seal sale. Now Christmas seal campaigns are conducted annually in most countries of the civilized world.

In this Province the campaign is organized by the Prince Edward Island Tuberculosis League. Mr. Morton Dew is chairman of the committee in charge. This year packets of seals have been mailed to 14000 Island homes, according to Miss Blanche Conway, League campaign executive.

These packets contain 200 seals each, for which the recipients are asked to contribute at least \$2.00 to assist in the work of the League. All funds realized in this campaign will be used to further the work of tuberculosis prevention in this Province, particularly the maintenance of the mobile X-ray unit. Last year this unit provided free X-rays to 13,031 persons. By this means were discovered many of the 57 new cases of tuberculosis which appeared last year.

He had been attending Columbia Bible College, Columbia, South Carolina, and was in his second year when illness forced him to return home in January of this year. He was a graduate of the Moncton High School. He was a musician of note having played in the High School orchestra, the High School cadet band and Mrs. Burbank's Band. He had been a member of the Ambassador choir of Columbia Bible College. He was also prominent as a musician with the Youth for Christ.

Surviving besides his parents are one brother, Gerald McAuley, Cangerbury, N.B.; one nephew, John McAuley, grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. M.D. Fullerton, Albert; several aunts and uncles.

The funeral service and parting tribute for Eakin M. Anglican Laymen Hear Speaker From National Organization

W.B.C. Burgoyne, vice-president of the National Laymen's Council was guest speaker at a meeting of the Deanery Laymen's Association held in St. Peter's Parish Hall last evening, with representatives from St. Peter's, and St. Paul's, Charlottetown and St. John's church, Milton, in attendance. The meeting was presided over by R.F. Acorn, president of St. Peter's Organization.

In the course of his remarks Mr. Burgoyne, in stressing Christian responsibility, said "All church people should look upon their membership of Christ in the Church as the central fact in their lives. They should regard themselves as individually sharing responsibility for the corporate life and witness of the Church in the places where they live."

Stressing the need for a positive attitude Mr. Burgoyne said, "It is no longer enough to merely accept the ministrations of the Church but rather it is of supreme importance that the whole Church, clergy and laity go forward in the joint commission of Christian stewardship. Time, talent and possessions are required in the program of work, work and witness," he said.

Mr. Burgoyne explained in detail the practice of the Brotherhood of Anglican Churchmen in the Diocese of Niagara which proved to be highly interesting and instructive and developed a question period which was taken part in by Walter Ryndman, Dr. Frank Jells, Rev. Canon Moffatt, Judge H.L. Palmer, Rev. Canon Ibbott and others.

A vote of thanks was moved by Edward Miller of St. Paul's and seconded by A.E. Bredren of St. Peter's.

Judge Elliot Hudson of Halifax, president of the Diocesan Laymen's Association who is accompanying Mr. Burgoyne on his tour of the diocese of Nova Scotia, also spoke briefly and answered a number of pertinent questions dealing with Laymen's Associations in this area.

Death Of Local Bakeries Manager

The death occurred at the P.E.I. Hospital yesterday afternoon of John D. Thomsen manager of the Maple Leaf Bakeries, Charlottetown, following a lengthy illness.

The deceased, who was in his 60th year, came to Canada from Denmark in 1928, and operated a farm near Summerside for several years. Later he was employed at Stewart's Bakery in Charlottetown and in 1937 opened the Maple leaf Bakeries.

Is Remanded In Manslaughter Case

Sydney (CP) — John William Hussey, 30-year-old Glace Bay taxi driver was charged with manslaughter Monday in the death of 30-year-old Gregory Pitman, a Glace Bay miner.

Pitman, with a broken nose and other facial injuries, died in hospital where he was taken when found lying face down in the street.

The charge was laid before Magistrate John F. MacDonald by Sgt. John McSweeney of the Glace Bay town police force. Hussey was remanded until Dec. 10 when he will appear for preliminary hearing.

To Stand Trial In Supreme Ct.

Edward Matthews, Charlottetown, charged with criminal negligence resulting in death, was committed to trial by judge and jury during the January session of the Supreme Court, by Magistrate K.M. Martin at the conclusion of preliminary hearings into the case in City Police Court yesterday.

The final witness for the Crown, Dr. H. Boyd, assistant provincial pathologist, gave evidence concerning the findings of the autopsy performed on the body of the late Joseph Frederick Steele. It is in connection with this man's death that Matthews is charged. No witnesses were called by the accused.

Also at yesterday's court, a man charged with driving while impaired, was fined \$100, and costs or 20 days in jail, while another person charged with being drunk and disorderly was fined \$20, and costs or 10 days in jail. A fine of \$10 and costs or five days in jail and a sentence of 10 days in jail was laid respectively against two persons charged with being drunk and incapable in the traffic department, a fine of \$10, and costs was imposed on a person for failing to stop at a stop sign and on another person charged with driving without a license. Another person charged with failing to stop at a stop sign was fined \$5, and costs.

Traffic Cases In Magistrate's Court

The cases of two Charlottetown residents charged with unlawfully taking a motor vehicle without the consent of the owner, were adjourned until December 3 by Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet in Queen's County Magistrate's Court yesterday morning. Four speeders, one each from Bedouque, Rose Valley, Amherst and Charlottetown, were each fined \$10 and costs. A fifth man, from Vernon, appearing on a similar charge except that it was his second offense of the season, was fined \$25 and costs.

For failing to stop at a stop sign, two persons from Charlottetown were each fined \$5 and costs. Similar fines were also imposed on a person from Spring Park for leaving a car parked on the highway unattended; on a person from Charlottetown for having defective equipment on a motor vehicle; and on another Charlottetown resident for failing to have licence plates on his vehicle.

ONE CANDIDATE—With Nominations for the Civic by-election only one day off, only one candidate has intimated his intention to offer for election in Ward Four. Local Union Certified As Bargaining Agent

The Provincial Minister of Labor, Hon. Forest W. Phillips, has officially notified the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America, Local 1338 of Charlottetown, that it has been certified with the M.F. Schurman Company as bargaining agency. The certification is provincial in scope. The president of the local, Mr. Eugene McCabe, received the letter of certification yesterday. Mr. McCabe, stated that the recognition of the union under the provincial law was the result of a long period of organization, followed by some weeks of negotiation and conversations with the Provincial Government.

The Union is now authorized by the Provincial Government to deal directly with the M.F. Schurman Co. in respect to wages and working conditions. It is the first time that a Charlottetown Carpenters' Union has been legally recognized as having such rights under provincial legislation so far as an island company is concerned. A similar certification, however, was obtained with reference to the Anglin-Norcross Co. during the erection of the Federal Building.

It is expected that a negotiating committee will confer with officials of the company within a few weeks to discuss an agreement.

The carpenters union has a membership of approximately fifty, and its certification with the M.F. Schurman Company is regarded as a forward step for organized labor in the Province.
