Meeting Held To Discuss S'side Yacht Club Plans

SUMMERSIDE — At a meeting of a yacht club in the Summerside area. The meeting was held in a building on the Summerside waterfront that was formerly occupied by Provincial Enterprises Ltd. It is this building that the club hopes to obtain for a club house.

The people listened as Richard Wedge and Frederick Hynnam outlined the need for such a club, alternate sites, means of financing and the functions of a yacht club.

It was pointed out that a club in Summerside at the location being considered has many advantages over such already established clubs at Shediac, Picton and even Charlottetown.

The site with landscaping repairs to the breakwater, provision made for a launching slip is said to be ideal for the proposed club.

The big need still remains to get as many people as possible interested in this venture, both Mr. Wedge and Mr. Hynnam said they would welcome any inquiries.

Noted Island Priest Msgr. Murphy Dies

One of the best loved and most widely known Roman Catholic priests in Prince Edward Island, Monsignor J. A. Murphy, D.D., former rector of St. Dunstan's University and honorary Vicar General of the Diocese, died early Friday in Charlottetown Hospital. He was 78 years old.

Msgr. Murphy was born in Hope River July 12, 1886, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. (Mary Ann McGowan) Alexis Murphy and received his education in Hope River and New Glasgow Schools and Prince of Wales College. He taught school at Alberton and Hope River from 1904 to 1907 before entering St. Dunstan's College from which he received his Bachelor of Arts (Laval) degree in 1910.

Appointed to the staff of Prince of Wales College, that year as mathematics professor, he taught there until 1916 when he entered St. Augustine's Sem-

She was the former Margaret Elizabeth Jenkins of Birch Hill. Her husband, who predeceased her about 30 years ago, was formerly from Millview.

The funeral was held Saturday at Stella Maris Church, Pictou, at 2 p.m. Sunday at which time burial in the Catholic cemetery.
