

# Stage Appears Ready For Seeding Operations

## WEATHER RECORDS

This week to date has come up with a very mixed pattern weather wise. Sunday morning produced three-quarters of an inch of ice and one of the coldest days ever for the time of year. By Sunday evening snow was falling and in certain places this snow remained about for near 48 hours - that must be a record as well.

However, in spite of cold and snow the great need was for moisture and the rain has been indeed very much needed and very welcome. A week of warm weather would produce a great transformation in the appearance of this province.

Very likely there has been, for this time of the year, more planting potatoes and seedlings of grain than for many years. Many farmers have been ready to carry out seeding operations but have hesitated feeling conditions were not favourable for growth. Possibly we can now assume that the stage is set and the proper policy, cropping wise at least, is full speed ahead.

Early in January the late E. D. Reid brought to the attention of the Federation of Agriculture the fact that warblers with pesticides were available in the United States but required to be certified for use in Canada. The matter went through the Federation of Agriculture to the proper authorities in Ottawa and it can now be reported that the material in question is available for the use of turnip growers.

**WARBLE FLY**  
Attention is directed to publicity being given by the Department of Agriculture to the second stage of the war on warbles. Cattle should be checked and if there is any evidence of the pest the contact man in the community can be consulted and has the necessary material.

**FARM TAXES**  
Generally the feeling has been growing on the part of farmers at least that there are inequities in the taxation system so far as land owners are concerned.

Recently a group of 100 Ontario farmers banded together to test certain taxation practices in Ontario. These farmers lived in a township where considerable development was taking place. Their contention was that their land should not be taxed to provide such services as water works, fire and police protection for what were in effect urban residential areas.

After considerable litigation the farmers have finally won their case and have been exempted from a portion of their property taxes by the Ontario Municipal Board.

The enlargement and consolidation of farms is occurring in all western developed countries. In Canada, as in many European countries, farm enlargement and consolidation have taken place mainly through what may be termed natural economic evolution. This is simply one farmer adding on to his own farm, land that had been farmed by another. Farm credit programs have greatly facilitated these adjustments.

In Canada and in some European countries, this natural consolidation has been quite rapid. The number of farms in Canada, for example, declined by more than 100,000 between 1951 and 1961. This is at the rate of over 10,000 a year. The natural

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# Mysterious Wu Han New Chinese Target

Judging by a vast flood of propaganda from Peking, the blackest enemy of the Chinese Communist party is a Chinese Communist official named Wu Han.

The indictment against Wu Han is a fascinating exercise in Communist logic. To hear Peking tell it, Wu is the centre of a threat to the existence of the regime.

Wu has become the main target of a campaign denouncing "anti-party, anti-Communist elements." The campaign has such a hysterical sound that it suggests panic in high places.

Mao Tse-tung's politburo has made Wu and "his supporters" object lessons. What is happening to them serves as a warning of what can happen to anyone who toys with the idea of opposing politburo policies.

As the politburo tells it, Wu Han as long as seven years ago "revealed his true face." But in those seven years he remained vice-president deputy mayor of the Peking city council and a respected historian and theoretician.

The propaganda fails to say why, if he revealed himself in 1959, he was not ousted. It fails to say why the Communist state continued to publish his works.

SPARKS DRIVE  
Wu just happens to be in the

centre of a violent drive against intellectuals and others - some inside the party, some inside the armed forces - now accused of threatening the politburo's rule. So the regime has constructed a case against Wu and flashed a signal for a drive against "enemies" throughout the country of 607,000,000 population.

The case is based on Wu's writings since the 1940s. In those days the Communists, including Mao, instructed followers to use any and all subtleties for infiltrating enemy ranks. Today, the things Wu wrote and said in those days are part of the indictment against him.

men in the 1940s would have been interpreted as condemning Chiang Kai-shek, the Nationalist China leader, and Chiang's Kuomintang party. Not so now, in retrospect.

In the 1940s Wu wrote that "the people are suffering." He claimed to champion "genuine democratic politics" - as Communists out of power invariably do. He wrote against one-party dictatorship. He deplored the sort of rule which gave all wealth, glory and power to one man.

These essays were published as a book in 1959. In the context of the 1940s, an attack on one-man rule and one-party dictatorship pointed to Chiang Kai-shek.

**DIDN'T EXPLAIN**  
But, says today's propaganda, Wu published his essays "without explanation." Thus, attacks on one-man rule and one-party rule could have another meaning. By 1959 Mao had all the power and glory.
