## THE RAILWAY SUBSIDY BILL

### Opposed by Members on all Sides

#### THE GOVERNMENT TWITTED ON THEIR CHANGED POLICY

Mr. Blair's Explanations are the Cause of Much Amusement.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, Aug. 4.—The House went into Committee on the Railway subsidy resolutions on the motion of Blair who admitted that the amount was unusually large.

Mr. Foster pointed out that the railway subsidy bill of this year was three times the average of the last ten years.

Mr. Nicholas Flood Davis, read the platform of the Liberal party, condemning railway subsidies, and had some fun with Sir Wilfrid Laurier about his change of policy.

Mr. Ross Robertson, independent Conservative said he supported the Intercolonial railway extension to Montreal and would have supported this measure if he could see anything in it but deception.

The late Government had made a mistake in subsidizing railways. This ministry had collected all mistaken policies of their predecessors and embodied all in one measure leaving out all the redeeming features.

It seemed to be impossible for this Government to get away from Mackenzie and Mann. That firm had held up the Local Governments of Ontario and Manitoba, and was now compelling the Dominion Government to stand and deliver.

The Government might as well hand over the whole treasury to this contractor's firm and be done with it.

The Patrons and Western Liberal members protested against the high subsidies given McKenzie and Mann.

Blair defended his programme with considerable warmth.

He created much amusement by his apology for bringing in his resolutions in the last days of the session.

Other Liberal leaders had denounced the late Government for leaving such measures till late in the session.

"Suppose we are inconsistent," said Blair, "we are here for practical purposes." (Loud opposition laughter.) "If members on this side demanded that the subsidy bill should come in early in the session they did not understand the difficulties they were inexperienced." (Loud opposition laughter.)

#### ESTEEMED EXCHANGES.

St. John Gazette: During the last twelve months 24,000 persons have paid for admission to the Shakespeare house at Stratford-on-Avon, and over 10,000 have registered at the Ann Hathaway Cottage. These visitors were not only Englishmen and Americans; they represented thirty-five nationalities and in the language of all these nationalities some of Shakespeare's sayings have been incorporated. No other writer ever made himself part of the world's speech, and probably no other writer ever will. Yet Shakespeare lived when barely half of the world was explored and when the educational advantages which are now almost universal were attainable only by very few.

#### SUMMER SCHOOL OF SCIENCE.

Sunday, the 30th ult., was an interesting day to the members of the Summer School. In the evening Rev. Dr. Borden of Sackville, N. B., preached in the Methodist Church on the "Relation of the School to Political morality." Monday was varied sunshine and shower but nothing to interfere with the work and enjoyment of the School. In the afternoon while some examined the books for plants, others the banks of the Restigouche for geological specimens, the majority accepted the invitation of Silmore Shives, Esq., to visit his extensive lumber mills. The evening was devoted to the discussion of Astronomy led by Mrs. Lewis of Hampton, N. B.

Tuesday was a gala day for the school. This was the day for the fondly anticipated excursion up the far-famed Metapedia valley. The morning was threatening and many enquiries were heard as to whether we could go or not, to which the response was "of course, Summer School of Science excursion days are always fine."

By ten o'clock the clouds had passed away and the prospect was all that could be desired, and about 150 eager excursionists boarded the train. At Morrissey's rock the party disembarked and lunched. Three hours were spent here in the examining the scenery and natural history to Metapedia where the residence of the celebrated "Restigouche Salmon Club," composed of American millionaires, the initiation to which is \$4000, was examined. Comfort and rustic beauty was combined in the structure and furnishing of this building. Thence to the Big Rapids of the Metapedia, where is imagination many of the party "shot the rapids" in canoes which were not nearly so disastrous to the comfort of the excursionists, the actual experience would have been. Again to Assametquaghan, where some of the party with true fisherman's instinct, despite the fact that the Dominion Fishery Commissioner was one of the expectant party determined to try their hand at a cast.

Two of the finny tribe were captured, but when the whistle blew to leave, one of the party, a P. E. Islander, was a prisoner on a small island in mid-stream, where his boat had left its moorings and left him. Rescue however was at hand, and without serious mishap he rejoined the party homeward bound, tired, yet delighted. They arrived at Campbellton barely in time to wash off the train dust and get out to the evening meeting, when Prof. Prince of Ottawa, Dominion Fishery Commissioner, lectured on "The Salmon and Salmon Fisheries of Canada." The history of the salmon from the deposit of the fish was clearly given, illustrated by stereoptican views. The enemies of the salmon fish, fowl, and man were described. Methods of fishing indicated, and means necessary to preserve this "king of fish" from being exterminated from Canadian waters were spoken of.

The school still grows in numbers, the enrolment has reached the unprecedented number of 206, the highest previous enrolment having been 192.

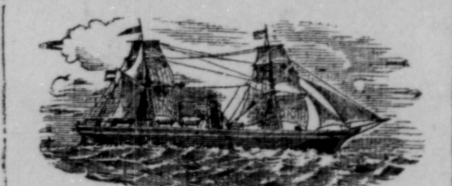
