Georgetown Legion Executive Meeting

A meeting of the Executive of the Georgetown Branch No. 16, Canadian Legion, B.E.S.L., was held in the Legion Hall on Thursday, Oct. 25th, with Branch President, Rev. W. A. Paterson, presiding. Major J. A. MacDonald of the Canadian Legion Branch at Cardigan, which will parade with the Georgetown veterans on Remembrance Day, attended the meeting. The main business of the meeting was to make arrangements for Remembrance Day programme. It was decided to invite a guest speaker for the occasion, whose name will be announced later. Following is the programme to be followed on Remembrance Day, which will be observed on Sunday, Nov. 11th at 2:00 p.m. The parade will form up at the Town Hall, under the direction of Parade Marshal Lawrence S. Batchelder, in the following order: Parade marshal, standard bearer, president of the Georgetown and Cardigan branches of the Canadian Legion, veterans of both World Wars, Georgetown Ladies Auxiliary, Mayor and Council, Government representative and district representatives, clergy, school children and citizens. Veterans will wear medals. The parade will move to the monument arriving at 2:00 p.m., where under the direction of the marshal the following programme will be carried out: "O Canada" by the school children, the observance of two minutes silence, Last Post by pipe, an appropriate selection on pipes, Reville, roll call of Georgetown and Cardigan veterans who gave their lives during service in World Wars I and II, poem, "They Shall Grow Not Old", prayer by clergy, the laying of wreaths in the order announced by the Marshal. The parade will then return to the Town Hall, where following the singing of the hymn, "O God Our Help in Ages Past", the speaker of the day will be heard. The ceremony will be brought to a close by the singing of the National Anthem. Veterans will be served sandwiches, cake and tea by the Ladies Auxiliary at the Legion Hall. The annual smoker will be held in the Legion Hall on Monday, Nov. 12th at 8:00 p.m. An invitation had previously been extended to Legion zone chairman, Roddie Martin of Victoria Cross to hold the 1951 zone rally at Georgetown. This invitation has been accepted and the rally will take place in the Legion Hall on Wednesday, Nov. 21st at 8:00 p.m. A team of experts from the Department of Veterans Affairs and from the Veterans' Land Act will be in attendance. The Executive voted to donate towards defraying the expenses of the transportation of the school children to Charlottetown for the Royal Visit, the sum of \$5.00 if the total cost is \$30.00 or \$7.50 if the total cost is \$45.00. Good Progress Made On New Valleyfield Bridge

The new bridge across the Valleyfield stream, near the site of the former Sutherland's Mill, near Montague, is now ready for the concrete paving which will be run in a few days. During the past few weeks the approaches to the bridge have been cleared of part of the old crib work, and rock has been placed at the bottom to prevent erosion. Eleven steel girders have been laid across the top, supported by piles driven to rock bed, and over these girders the concrete will be laid.

The new bridge replaces the old one which was too light to carry the heavy traffic, and which was giving signs of bearing too heavy loads. It was approximately 46 feet long, with a centre pile support which had been moved out of position by the heavy loads. With the crib work on either side giving away, the old bridge lacked the necessary support. The wearing away was caused by the two water ways on either side of the central support, since not having sufficient width for the volume of water flowing, the current eroded the bed around the support piles to make the bridge unsafe.

The new bridge with a 24-foot top replaces the old 18-foot one. It will have a central span of 30 feet, and two end spans of 10 feet each. There is no central pile support, thus leaving a 30 foot waterway, sufficient to carry off the volume of water even during the spring freshet. Five of the girders in the central span are reinforced to give double strength to the more travelled portion, and the other six are larger than the approach girders, so that the structure can support a much greater weight than formerly. There are six piles at either end of the 30
