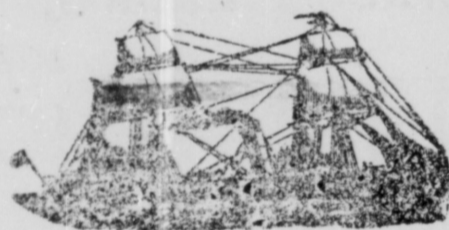

ECLIPSE OF THE SUN.—The total eclipse of the sun, which will occur next Monday, will not be visible in Charlottetown. All we shall see here, provided we have no clouds, will be about nine-tenths of the sun's disc covered by the moon. Still we shall not have the darkness of the places where the eclipse will be total, which at its best will last for but two minutes, and this is thrown away on the wastes of the North Atlantic. We should expect the eclipse a little before nine o'clock in the morning. With a cloudless sky, we shall see a dazzling crescent of light on one side of the moon, and then our share of the eclipse will make quite a fine show.
