A SUCCESSFUL fishing excursion was held at Souris on Saturday night last. Over two thousand mackerel, weighing a pound and a quarter and a pound and a half a piece, were taken; also a large number of hake. The party returned early to Souris, well pleased with their trip.

CAPTAIN WEBB, the champion swimmer, has challenged Mr. Wallace Dunlop, of England, who is the inventor of plate swimming, to swim any distance from one to five miles, for \$500 a side. In plate swimming the swimmer wears light circular wooden plates on his hands and feet.

MRS. JOHN THOMAS, Hammonds Plains, 97 years of age, completed a quilt with 9,750 pieces in a month, and did her housework besides. The husband of this smart old lady did not think this worth publishing till he noticed some time ago in a paper of young lady at Laenburg completing one with 10,000.

THE Winnipeg cricketers who are now making a tour of the Upper Provinces, are evidently fine players. They met the Ottawa team a few days ago, and scored 250 runs in their first innings. One player, Stanford, alone made 101 runs. The Ottawa team had several wickets down for less than 50 runs, and it was supposed the strangers would win easily in one inning.

THE St. JOHN News says trout fishing is unusually good this year. It is not uncommon now to hear of sixteen inch trout being caught in a two-inch stream. We may add that the fishing in New Brunswick cannot be compared to the fishing on P. E. Island. It is nothing uncommon to hear of an angler "hushing" twelve pound salmon and four pound trout ashore at Morell. Some wonderful stories are told by the fishermen.

A SCARCITY of pork is reported from Chicago. A despatch of the 2nd says:—For the first time in the history of pork packing the mammoth concerns at the Chicago Stock Yards of Fowler Bros., and Atkinson & Co., packing provision companies, are shut down through scarcity of hogs. Over 2,500 men are out of employment. The cause is attributed to the high price of corn the past few months, farmers selling grain instead of feeding it to their stock.

A MOVEMENT is on foot for the purpose of making suitable provision for the decent care of the old burying ground. It is proposed to build a house near the grounds, and to place a watchman in the same. It is said that the grounds have become a rendezvous for loafers and others of questionable fame, that the iron railings have been sold for old iron, and the graves have been in various other ways desecrated. It is nearly time that something was done in the matter.

Important War News.

Arabi Driven Back.

The British Cool and Steady.

ALEXANDRIA, August 7.

On Saturday afternoon when the sun was declining, there was a hurried movement in the camp. The call was, "to arms," and the marines, under the immediate command of General Alison, together with the riflemen of the South Staffordshire Regiment, and a full force of mounted infantry, advanced towards Arabi's line of defence near Ramlah, between the Marmoudiet Canal and Cairo. The object of the movement was to endeavor to make the enemy show the strength of his forces, and their fighting capacity. The enemy did but little effective work, holding themselves in reserve and taking shelter behind their lines of defence. At one time the battle was fierce, and was strongly contested, the forces of Arabi being driven back to their second line of entrenchment. The British forces, under the command of their gallant General behaved with the greatest coolness and steadiness, under the heavy fire from the entrenchments, and proved themselves to be worthy successors of the sons of Wellington and of Nelson. The battle was prolonged well into the night, and many Egyptian prisoners of war fell into British hands. The British movement was a complete success. The losses on both sides are not yet ascertained.

Hanlan has just received the challenge from Ross to row a five mile race for \$1,000 and the championship of the world. Hanlan has not yet made any reply to the same.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 3.

The conference will sit again on Friday. At yesterday's sitting the question of the protection of the Suez Canal was discussed. M. Onon, the Russian representative, expressed the view that the law binding the conference required that Turkey should first endeavor to restore order in Egypt. Should Turkey not succeed in this endeavor, then the powers should undertake the task. The German representative and Austro-Hungarian ambassador concurred in this opinion. The British ambassador said he desired Turkey to take action on condition that the Porte declares Arabi a rebel. Said Pasha, the Turkish Prime Minister, maintained that it was impossible for the Porte to declare Arabi a rebel until the Ottoman flag was raised in Egypt, when the conduct of Arabi would be determined and measures taken accordingly.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 4.

DeLesseps has telegraphed the Porte protesting against Admiral Seymour's action concerning the Suez Canal. He declares that he is in no danger from Arabi Pasha, who, he says, has already given numerous proofs of humanity.

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 4.

H. M. S. Bittern returned from Aboukir, and reports having seen several trains arrive at Aboukir full of soldiers. Persons who arrived from Kafred Dewar estimate Arabi's forces at 7,000. Arabi issued a proclamation accusing the English of cowardice, taunting them, and daring them to attack him. There was slight firing on Wednesday near Pompey's pillar.

Arabi has forbidden the inhabitants to supply fresh provisions to Christians on pain of death. Arabi's proclamation states "Egyptian soldiers with excusable zeal fired only the buildings belonging to hostile Europeans and killed only those detected in communication with the enemy. The traitor Khedive, having opened the gates of the city to English troops, for this act is deposed by the Saita, who will send troops to assist us to drive out our enemy."

LONDON, Aug. 4.

The Times' Berlin despatch says that the outbreak of serious differences between England and the Porte regarding the proclaiming of Arabi a rebel is considered almost unavoidable.
