Thoughts For Our Time

ROMANCE NOT ALL-IMPORTANT

No thinking person can be other than appalled at the increasing manifestations of failure in married life. The divorce rate, the number of desertions, the rise in juvenile delinquency, all underline some fundamental failures in the very approach to married life.

And as is the case in every social evil, the basic cause of the evil lies in deep-rooted errors in judgment, mistaken ways of thinking. In the case of marriage, surely one of the chief causes of the failure of so many to achieve the deep and fruitful happiness which God intended, is the attitude taken by young people preparing for marriage.

As a result of two centuries of exaggerated romanticism, young people now take it as an axiom it is better to be ruled by the heart than by the head. And they cannot be blamed for this. Every source of entertainment to which they are exposed gives them the impression that love is simply a matter of expressing emotions and satisfying desires in a state of unending and idyllic bliss.

The popular songs they sing, the movies they see, the stories they read in magazines, all serve to strengthen that basic misconception, that love is essentially an emotion, and that reason plays little or no part in the expression of love.

One result of this false conception is that the boy or girl seeking a partner for marriage leaves out, only too often, considerations which are essential even for a minimum guarantee of happiness. Is the boy conscientious? Will he be faithful in his duties as father and breadwinner? What is his family background? What is the nature and the strength of his religious beliefs? Can he be depended on in the emotional crises which must invariably come to any married couple?

Every girl should ask these and other questions about a young man, even before there is any question of intense emotional attachments, before clear thinking is made almost impossible. And the boy must ask some questions too. Will this girl be able to make a comfortable home? Can she cook? Has she the qualities I want in the woman who will bear my children and be the main formative influence on their lives? Has she achieved emotional maturity; that is, does she realize that there is more to marriage than superficial emotional titillation?

None of these questions can be answered by the heart. It is the work of the intellect, to make these evaluations. This is not to eliminate romance, or to deny the place in courtship of emotional attraction; these are certainly important elements in God's plan of drawing men and women together to continue His creative work in the family.
